DOCTOR LISTENS TO PATIENT TALK OF WALLS, PRISON

Leaves Broken and Rivers Continue Rise Due to Heavy Rainfall.

WASHINGTON, April 15—Warning of excessively higher river stages was issued by the Weather Bureau today for central and south central states where floods and storms already have taken a heavy toll in lives and damage.

Several small cities are threatened, although hundreds of business men and farmers are maintaining long vigil on river levees.

One Drowned.—One casualty has been reported, Anthony Webb, farmer near St. Louis, Mo. was drowned while attempting to drive cattle through overflow lowlands near Hannibal, Mo.

A canal in East St. Louis, Ill., overflowed today, flooding a number of city properties was inundated.

The high water situation is general over the territory. The Mississippi is approaching flood stage in several places; the Grand river in Oklahoma has reached the highest stage in history.

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AVIATORS ESTABLISH RECORD AND IMMEDIATELY START TALK OF PROPOSED TRIP TO PARIS

NEW YORK, April 15—Bert Acosta and Clarence D. Chamberlin, pilot holders of the world's sustained flight record, ran up the morning with 31 hours, 11 minutes and 29 seconds of flight stretched out of their legs and started discussing plans for a flight to Paris.

The feat of Acosta and Chamberlin in flying a Wright-DeLaurie monoplane for six hours longer than any man ever flew a plane before made them sudden favorites in the \$25,000 New York to Paris non-stop derby. All they have to do is to duplicate the 35 hours or so of their flight in a more or less straight line instead of following the meandering circuitous course that for the first flight which ended on Long Island yesterday.

G. M. Bellanca, designer and builder of the newly fitted plane used in the 51 hour flight, announced the New York-Paris flight would start "early in May" in the same plane. He said Acosta and Chamberlin "probably" would pilot the machine, and it was confidently hoped he would get back on a certain day which had once proved successful. At least, it was felt certain that one of the two would make the flight, although it might be necessary to substitute a trained navigator for one of them.

Validity of Ordinance Requiring Revolving Gate at Station in Residential District is Challenged. Council Appoints Officers.

The ordinance veto the city council last evening rejected the petition for prohibition to test the curfew law for its proposed station at the intersection of Shoshone street with Blue Lake boulevard and Adair street, and instructed the city attorney, Captain E. M. Sweely, to take all steps necessary either to bring action to prevent erection of the station or to defend any action that the company might bring.

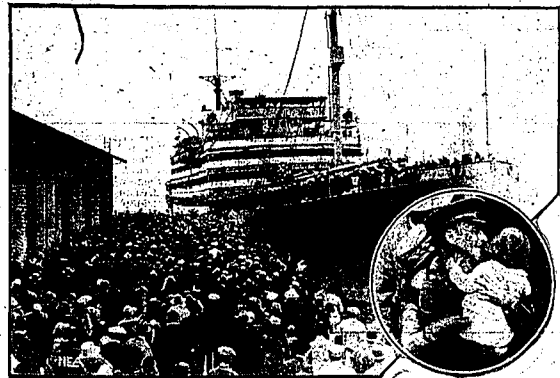

TRAGIC DEATH FOLLOWS FALL INTO CANYON

The body of William T. Greener, of Declo, who met tragic death Thursday afternoon when he fell over the precipice into the Snake river canyon Thursday afternoon, near the Hansen bridge, was today being held for preparation for interment. Accompanied by his brother, Byron Greener, 16, the young man drove to the bridge to visit the scenery, and while walking on the narrow rock slipway and coasted his way into the canyon 500 feet below.

The accident, according to the younger brother happened between 1 and 2 o'clock. 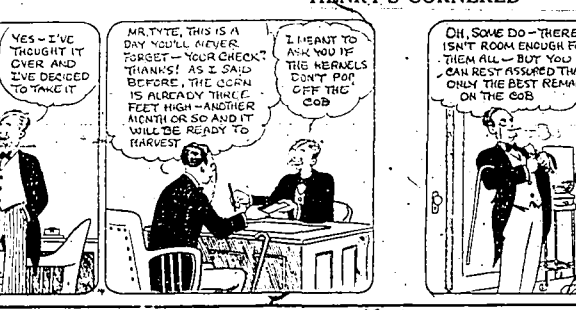

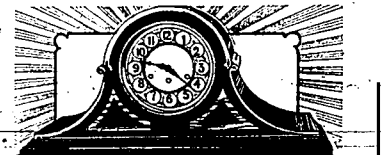

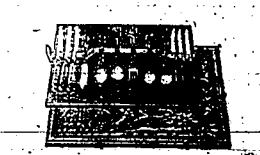

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of four articles revealing an amazing situation in the State Department.

BY RODNEY DUTCHER, News Service Writer
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—More than 100 diplomatic officers and about 600 consular officers in the professional-foreign service of the United States. That does not include our ministers and ambassadors.

The present internal dissension in the State Department is due to the contention of the consular officers that although they are all classified equally in the various grades by act of Congress, promotions and plums are being dealt out to diplomatic officers on the basis of social position and wealth, whereas consular officers are neglected and robbed of decent prospects for retirement in spite of an average greater maturity, ability and experience.

Nine Classes

The 700 foreign service officers are divided into nine classes whose "dibs" include consuls, general and consuls of embassy, \$2000 a year. Class II includes consuls general and consuls of legation at \$5000. Class III at \$7000 includes consuls general, consuls and first secretaries. Class IV includes consuls and first secretaries at \$8000 and so on down the line through the consuls, second secretaries, and vice consuls who are paid from \$2500 to \$3000.

In two years, the consular inspectors may 70 per cent of the diplomatic branch was promoted as compared with 40 per cent of the consular branch. Thirty diplomatic men remain to be promoted as compared with 20 consular men. Further, they point out, about 55 per cent of the consular officers are dependent on their salaries while 80 per cent of the diplo-

matic officers are independent of what they earn.
The main snafu is that the personnel board is parking the upper grades with young and inexperienced men. There is one diplomat for every two consular officers in the \$5000 class, one for every three in the \$7000 class and soon down to the first class, \$5000, where the ratio is one to eight.

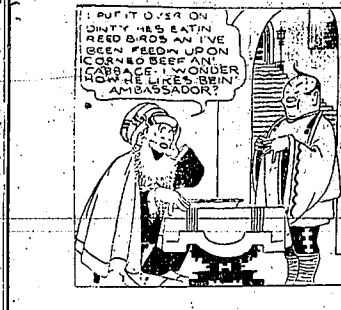
Herits Are Limited
There are just as many herits in higher grades. If a man 35 years old hits the top and becomes an assistant secretary of state, he presumably will stay upstairs as long as he lives. At 62, meanwhile, a 25-year-old consular, with infinitely more service and experience, is harked out of promotion and the job he may have been working toward for 30 years, down to the first class. "Grade background" has been given the top notch; he had every right to expect the better if the army and navy began to make 35-year-old generals and admirals.

The chairman of the personnel board is Joseph C. Grew, undersecretary of state. His associates are J. Blatter Wright and Wilbur J. Carr, assistant secretaries of the diplomatic branch. One of the consular service and supposedly in sympathy with the men under him, but Grew and Wright are accused of being the heads of the inner circle of social diplomats which has set the precedent of a diploma over working class.
The board's control of division of the two branches is to provide ample promotions for its favorites. It is charged, so that the consular branch is unable to turn back money each year the consular branch hasn't enough to pay for its own men, promoted into higher classes.

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STARTLING CHARGES ARE MADE IN CASE FROM ROCK CREEK

George P. Bailey Declares That Van Eatons Came to His Farm, Attacked Him and Threatened to Shoot; Questions of Attorney for Defendant Imply Bailey Aggressor.

Startling charges were made today in the direct examination of George P. Bailey, on whose complaint Lou Van Eaton and Harold Van Eaton are in the probable count in a preliminary, charged with felonious assault with deadly weapon on the person of Bailey at his home April 3. Questions by E. V. Larson, attorney for defendant, indicated that Van Eatons contend that Bailey was the aggressor, though the defense put on no testimony. The hearing was before Probate Judge G. A. Bailey.

According to Bailey, he has known the defendants about six years. He says that they had always been friendly and that on the morning of April 3, he was awakened when they drove up to his house, and on his opening the door, began to call him names. He says he shut the door and told his wife that they were drunk, but later went out. He claims that he asked Lou Van Eaton if he would look for trouble and the latter declared with an oath that he was and that he would kill him. He says that he saw a Remington rifle on the table in the window in the cab of the truck in which he was and that he saw new signs he grabbed the rifle by the barrel and held it. After a struggle he called Mel Pender, a friend of his, to come and take the rifle which he did. He claims that while he was struggling with the rifle, Harold came around and grabbed him and struck him with another rifle, a .22-caliber gun. He then told him his hold would eventually loosen on the Remington and that he would shoot for trouble and did not let go.

After the close of direct examination by Prosecuting Attorney O. W. Wittman, the defense attorney examined the witness, apparently along the line of defense. Mr. Larson asked him if he did not go to the Van Eaton home the evening before and start a quarrel. This he denied. He also denied that he saw the Van Eaton rifles and called to his wife to bring his rifle, and that he had asked for a club for the same purpose; that he had threatened them; he denied that he had brought out the rifle. Mr. Larson asked him if he had not seen the rifle in the Van Eaton car and tried to get it and if the struggle was not the result of the effort of Van Eaton to get possession of it. Bailey denied this also. Mel Pender, the neighbor told about being called by Bailey to come and get the gun and said he did not. Douglas Galt, young son of complaining witness, also testified for the state.

TWIN FALLS BEANS ARE RECOGNIZED BY U. S. GOVERNMENT

Request is Made for Bids for 16,000 Sacks of Great Northern Variety; Comes Too Late to Be Complied With; Michigan is Stricken from Available List.

The excellence of the Great Northern bean was this week officially recognized by the government of the United States, when asked the Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association to submit bids for 16,000 sacks of this product. The bean growers' association was unable to bid in the competition, since it did not get the contract in equal lots. It only by depriving regular customers of part of their supply.
