Snyder Death Details Given by Prosecution

Witness Asserts Albert Snyder Was Tricked into Signing \$50,000 Life Insurance Policy 16 Months Before His Death; Hotel Clerk Testifies... By United Press.

LONG ISLAND CITY, N. Y., April 25—Albert Snyder was tricked into signing a \$50,000 life insurance policy, providing almost double indemnity in case of accidental death when he actually only sought a \$1,000 policy, Leroy Ashfield testified today at the trial of Ruth Brown Snyder and Henry Judd Gray.

Acting upon instructions of Mrs. Snyder, Ashfield said he induced Snyder to sign two applications, one for the small endowment policy and the other blank. Ashfield said he never saw Snyder again and that Mrs. Snyder directed the filling out of the application for the large amount, telling him she would pay the premiums herself.
