

# A NEW STEP

Appointment of Mr. L. E. Spainhower to be editor of The Times is announced tomorrow, it is announced today by the management.

Mr. Spainhower arrived yesterday in Twin Falls from Helena, Mont., where he has been city editor of The Independent, one of the oldest newspapers of the Treasure State, previous to which he was a member of the editorial staff of the Associated Press at Denver.

The new management of The Times has been negotiating with Mr. Spainhower for some time, believing that his experience would be an asset to the paper in its program of giving the people of Twin Falls and the Territory a first class newspaper and that the citizens of the community would appreciate his addition to this area's already large list of young, energetic business and professional men.

Mr. Spainhower is not a stranger to the management, having been assistant editor of the Great Falls Tribune, the largest paper in Montana, for more than three years and of the Gate at Billings for approximately the same length of time while we were in that state. Neither is he a stranger to Idaho, having resided at Pocatello for more than three years during which time he was connected with the Oregon Short Line railroad and for a time was editor of the old Pocatello News.

His first experience was with the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and the St. Louis Star, so that he has a metropolitan ground work for his career, with sufficient other experience to realize that smaller cities are just as important as the large centers, an attribute which many newspapermen lack.

Mr. Spainhower is conservative and safe in his methods but expects to do some new gathering and distribution in this territory to fill the demand for a real daily newspaper. The belief of The Times' management that southern Idaho wants and can support a first class paper has been substantiated by many of its leaders.

Mr. Spainhower expects to make Twin Falls his permanent home and Mrs. Spainhower and their two sons came here with him. He will be pleased to discuss problems affecting this territory with any of its citizens at any time and, through the columns of The Times will do his best to help to aid any worthy cause.

### HIGH COURT FIXES VALUES

### U. S. Tribunal Sets \$17,575,741 for Rate Making Purposes in Idaho.

BOISE, Idaho, April 29—Seven years of litigation over the valuation of the Idaho Power company's rate making purposes came to an end here today Thursday when an eminent judge handed down a federal court fixing the value at \$17,575,741. Upon this amount the seven per cent necessary return at 12 per cent.

This valuation is \$300,000 higher than the one found by the public utilities commission, and approximately \$5,000,000 below the figure computed by the company's engineers. The arguments in federal court were heard of a special statutory court of three members—Judge Cushman, District and McManam. It being held in another case by the United States supreme court that only one judge could decide such a plea the findings as handed down Thursday were those of Judge Cushman.

In the original order of the utilities commission seven and one-half per cent was set as the rate of return on property used for general purposes, five to five and one-half per cent for certain other properties, such as that used for irrigation purposes, and the maximum average return of over seven per cent. Under the court's decision the rate was fixed at 7 per cent, being limited to seven per cent.
