## USING WASTE PRODUCTS IS GREAT SAVING

Ingeniously in the utilization of waste products has been an enormous factor in American business success, according to John D. Locke, owner of the largest lumber business in New York, and a member of the board of directors of the National American Lumber Manufacturers Association. He gives five significant illustrations from the lumber industry.

"I once bought a tract of timber in New Brunswick, where the lumber jacks found a quantity of rock maple log defective to market in the ordinary way, because of its heavy knots," he says. "Immediately after buying some maple for this maple," he says. "I struck a man who was cutting maple shoe lasts in Massachusetts. A shoe last must be made of the hardest wood and even then it is absorbed. If it is absorbed, it will not hold its shape for long. For ten years I sold rock maple last from my waste pile in New Brunswick."

"In New Jersey there used to be an abundant supply of black walnut, for which there was no very active market. After considerable study, I found that among Jewish shopkeepers in Europe there was a superstition that a one-piece black walnut counter would bring, and a merchant starting in business was willing to pay almost any price for it. So while I spread this market that I sold through to Holland for many years at excellent prices."

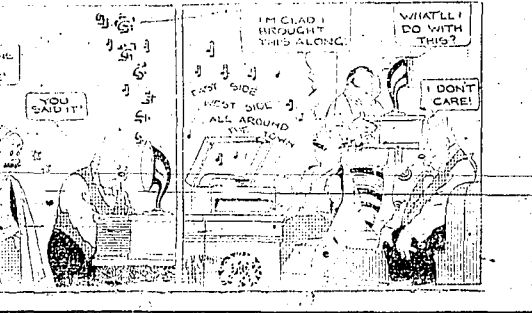
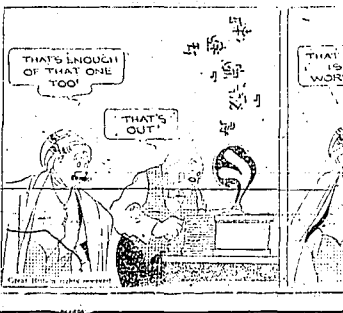
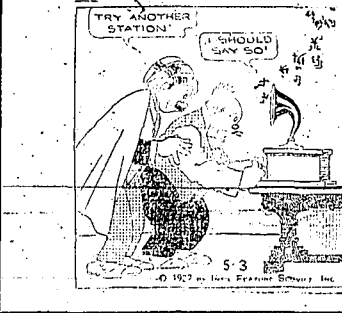
