STRIBLING FAILS AND DROPS OUT AS CONTENDER IN RING

Atlanta Boy Does Not Show Even Fair Form Against Tommy Loughran, Who Wins Decision in Unimpressive Style.

 BROOKLYN, N. Y., May 4.—Jack DeJure, light heavyweight boxing champion, was the real winner of the first outdoor boxing show of the eastern season here last night, although he did not enter the ring.

Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia, and Young Stribling, the once-ventured Georgian, were the batters, and what they showed did not afford any cause for worry over their ambitions to take the title. Loughran scored an easy victory over the erratic Atlanta boy but he did not look much like a championship contender.

The fight probably ended Stribling's last pretensions to a place among the

first rates. The Georgian who once was hailed as a young phenomenon, with a chance to become the heavyweight champion, won only one round or possibly two and Loughran had a clear edge in five. The others were even.

Stribling, dazed, tumbled and wrestled after his regular fashion, showing no trace of his prouder reform. Loughran pestered him with heavy blows and took the fight out of him by pounding on his heart, but the Philadelphia man was unable to score even close to a knockout.

The fight drew 10,000 fans, 25,000 spectators who held their seats through a brief rain during the preliminaries.

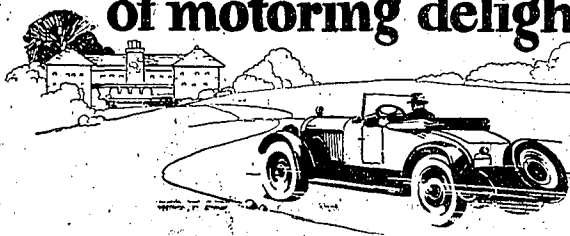

SPAIN IN CONFESSION TO FORGERY AND WANTS SENTENCE AT ONCE

Man Who Served in Jail for Illegal Possession as C. E. Dixon Admits Name is Fictitious; Van Eatons Are Fined; Two Men and One Woman Draw Sentences.

Declaring that his name is Ray C. Spain instead of C. E. Dixon, and that a man brought here from Mountain Home by William Dutton, deputy sheriff, was bonded over to the district court today by C. A.
