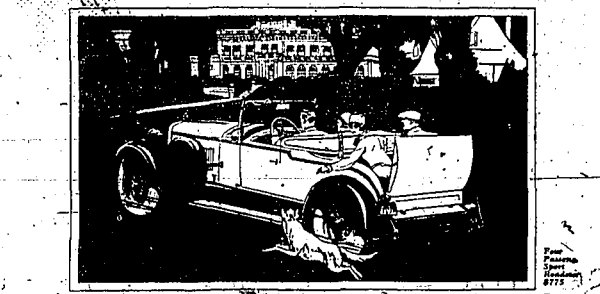

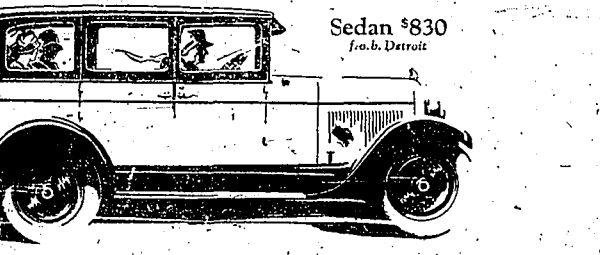

SEEK LOST GOLD WHICH COST TWO LIVES IN HAREM

PEKING, May 7.—A true Tom Sawyer buried treasure hunt is in progress within the secret walls of the Purple Forbidden City of Peking—a hunt for fifty golden bars which cost the lives of two lovely concubines of the Emperor Kwang-Hai.

An Esser Chinese woman, who, thirty years ago, was attendant to the two concubines is teller of the tale which led to this search.

According to her story, as told in the office of the Palace Museum, the late Empress Dowager who is famed as China's last strong ruler, and who ruled the weakling Kwang Hui with the proverbial rod of iron, reported to a pile of office to gratify her desire for funds with which to carry out such projects as the building of the New Summer Palace west of Peking. This demolished the Imperial Household, and two concubines accepted a bribe of fifty golden bars from an official of Peking palace.

Learning of this, the Empress summoned the concubines and demanded the golden bars. Upon being refused, a refusal made worse by the concubines' counter-charge that she herself had not them, a mad example of the Empress ordered them into close confinement and subsequently, executed them in a public suicide just before the flight of the Court which the foreign Boxer Relief Force arrived in 1900.

The woman who tells the story was then a girl of sixteen, and she, an attendant to the two concubines, helped them conceal the booty. Several buildings have been constructed on the site and initial search has been unavailing, but, with the promise of three gold bars as reward if the treasure is found, the woman is helping in a vigorous hunt.
