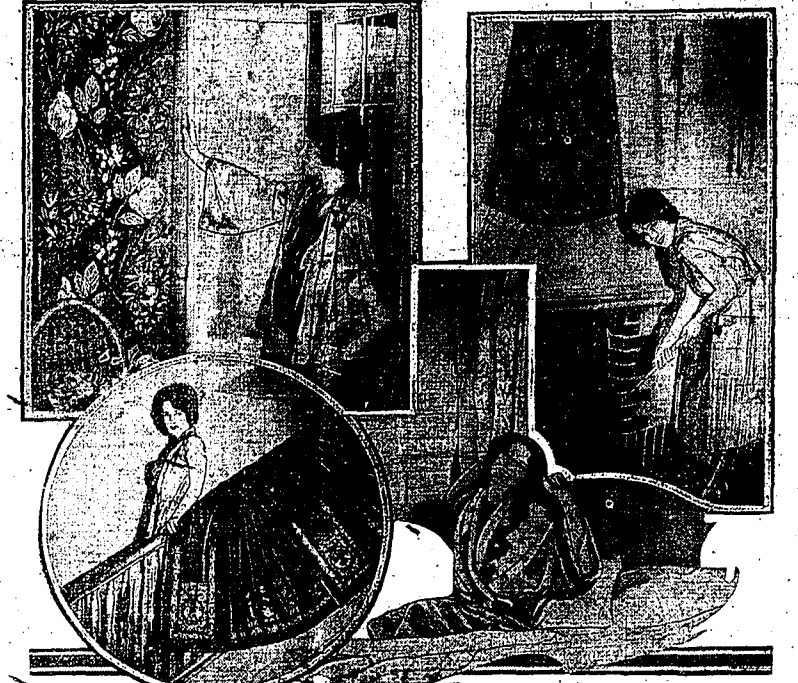

**FURTHER SUGGESTIONS FOR DOG FEEDING**  
 MAJ. J. H. GIBBS

It is generally held that the amount that should be allowed at each meal, are questions which are often asked in an anxious desire to become necessary to the owner of a dog, because a good deal depends upon the individual dog—some are naturally heavy eaters, and others light. As a rule, the dog should be fed from two to three months old, ought to get two or three meals a day. From three to five months, feed them four times daily, and gradually cut down until, at eight months, they are getting three meals. By the time he is a year old the average dog ought to do well on two feedings a day—a light one in the morning, and something more substantial at night.

As to the quantity to give at each meal, there are only two sure guides: First, the dog's condition—he should be neither fat nor noticeably thin; and second, don't let him stuff himself until he looks like a toy balloon. Give him as much as he is really keen for, but no more. There is plenty of chance for you to use judgment and common-sense in these matters, and I assure you they will mean a great deal to the well-being of your dog.

Whatever the size and frequency of the meals may be, keep them regular. One of the most

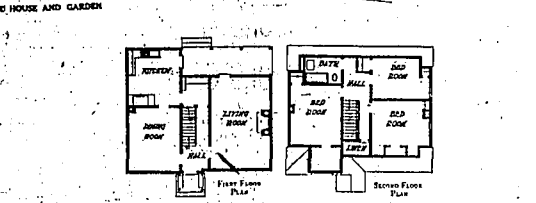
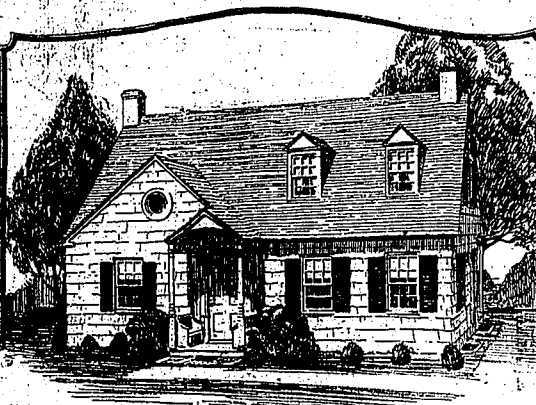

## No Wasted Space in This Cozy Little Home



Two considerations are of vital interest to the man who builds a small house, and the second of these is closely allied to the first. Economy of expense is the major consideration; conservation of space is the next factor of importance, and one which keeps expense down.

Today's small house which has so wasted space. Every inch of it is put to work and affords a definite purpose. On the first floor are the living and dining rooms and the kitchen. The living room in the largest room of the house and extends its out-of-door depth. Windows on three sides give it the maximum amount of air and light. A large rear living room, which in this case overlooks the sea, may be gained from the living room. The dining room and kitchen occupy one side of the house and open into each other.

A central hallway runs from the entrance doorway to the rear wall of the house, and in it we find the stairway to the second story. The stairs to the basement are placed directly beneath the outer stairway, to conserve space.

On the upper floor we find three bed rooms of ample size, each one having two closets for storing clothes, etc. The master's bedroom has a large storage closet containing a window. The bath is located at the rear of the house in back of the master's bedroom.

## HOUSE AND GARDEN WILD FLOWERS FOR SHADE

Dear Jimmy,

I knew it would be only a question of time before you became interested in starting a garden of wildflowers. In a state we all reach sooner or later, and some of us never get over it.

As a matter of fact, the answer to the question of what to plant in heavy shade, whether the lack of sunlight is caused by trees or buildings, may frequently be found in woodland wildflowers, both herbaceous and woody. There is plenty of color and variety in such material and, in the main, there is little difficulty in succeeding with the plants if the conditions of their natural habitats are exemplified. Without such duplication of natural soil and exposure conditions many of the most desirable wildlings will make but a poor showing though few are unobtainable enough to thrive almost anywhere.
