## Mrs. Snyder and Gray Will Hear Death Sentence Friday

### APPEAL PLEA TO BE FILED

Dismissal Will Be Sought by Woman's Counsel; Leave Promptly for Prison.

LONG ISLAND CITY, N. Y., May 12.—Mrs. Judd Snyder and Henry Judd Gray will be taken before Justice Townsend Scudder tomorrow to hear themselves sentenced to death in the electric chair.

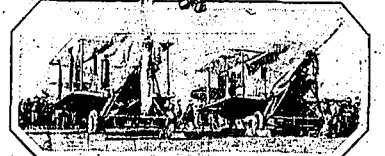
Tomorrow will be Friday, the 13th. R. P. Hackett, attorney for Mrs. Snyder, will file a motion tomorrow that the verdict of first degree murder be set aside, and if that is overruled, a motion for an arrest of judgment to be granted. The appeal probably will be due up until fall.

Whether Grays attorneys will file such a motion was not announced. An appeal as the formality of sentence is over, Gray and Mrs. Snyder will be in separate institutions and taken to Sing Sing prison.

There they will be dressed in regulation prison garb of blue, brown and tan and brown or blue tunic for the women, with canvas prison-made underclothes.

### SIX ARE KILLED, 41 INJURED BY EXPLOSION DURING FIRE

DALLAS, Texas, May 12.—Lentition of gas which had leaked from a pipe was given today as the explanation of the blast which last night wrecked an apartment house and building here, killing six persons and injuring 41 others.

The explosion occurred on the first night during the work in the men were fighting a blaze which broke out in the building early in the evening. Thirty-two men were on the second floor of the building attending a labor meeting when the explosion came.

W. Henry Lee, fire captain, was almost instantly killed, and four others were injured. Persons many feet away from the building were injured by flying glass and falling debris.

Firemen and police worked all night to bring the fire under control, but it took 24 hours to burn it down. The bodies of the six dead were recovered before midnight, but it was not until the morning that the bodies of the others were recovered.

### WARNING IS BROADCAST

Raging Waters of Missouri River Expected to Add to Midwest Disasters.

WARREN, Mo., May 12.—Warfare in the Missouri valley is being broadcast to all communities and farms along the swirling stream from Phoenix, Ariz. to Omaha and Council Bluffs on both the Nebraska and Iowa sides of the River by the weather bureau here today. High 25, 25 miles from Omaha, reported at 10:20 a. m. that the river had risen within six inches of crest stage and gave promise of breaking over the adjacent farm lands and pastures in the next few days.

Water enters Council Bluffs. The water this morning had begun to flood some of the lower districts of Council Bluffs. Fear was expressed that the cutoff west end section of Council Bluffs with a population of more than 15,000 persons would be inundated.

Persons near Blair were returning their livestock and household goods to higher land and persons living close to the river were being urged to evacuate their homes. The water in the past three days had risen only about two feet from flood stage.

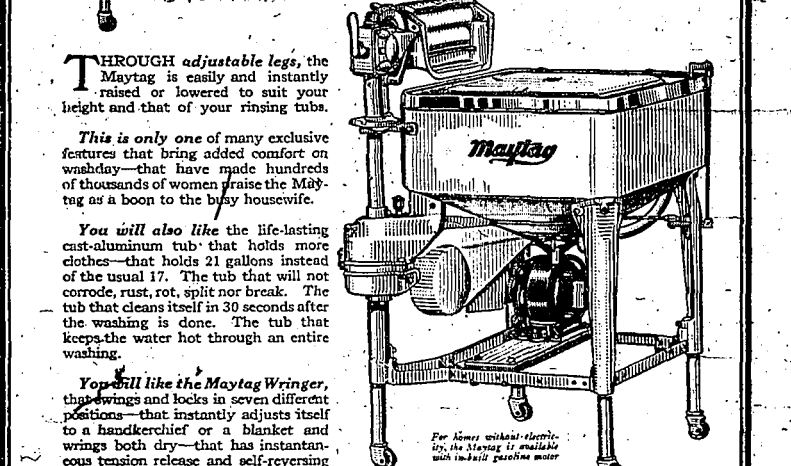

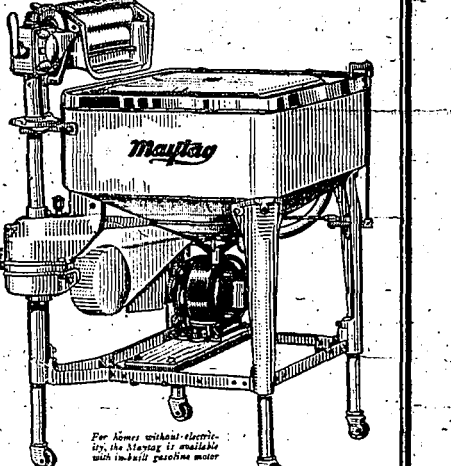
