RUTH SNYDER RIDES LIKE BRIDE TO KEEP DATE WITH GROOM, DEATH

Woman, Charged With Murder of Husband, Comes to What Likely Will Be End of World, Singing Death Hour; Gray Follows Her in.

OSKINSK, N. V., May 17—(W. P. A.)—Ruth Snyder, in a gray riding habit, rode with her groom, a man in a dark suit, to the Sing Sing prison in the early morning of June 2. 



Notice of the department of the publication was served upon The Times by Postmaster McChesney after the papers were delivered at the postoffice for entry.

Publication of The Times was started a week ago and it has carried Bull news entirely. The Twin Falls Times has been inside the Bull Times for the Bull and Bull neighborhood subscribers.

Each paper was printed yesterday and the latest message had been done for a week and after The Times had gone to all of that labor and expense the postmaster barred the paper from the mails without giving The Times a chance to make delivery.

It is a mistake to say that the Times is bringing the papers here. The Times office is in the Bull section and remain the Twin Falls regular section.

Only approximately 4 per cent of the acreage was winter wheat compared with a much larger percentage last year.

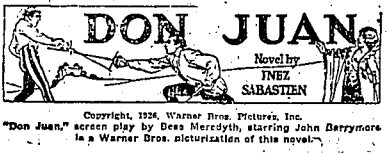
THE PRINCE PALMS

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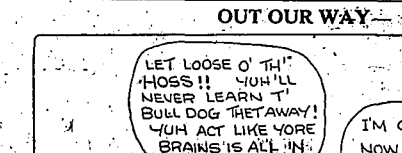

Perennials for Cutting

The planning and planting of even small perennial garden is a source of beauty both indoors and out. Our flowers are delightful, but it is their color and their growth which are placed with the night and scent of bouquets. Both these enjoyments more than repay the gardener for his time and expense, so that even the smallest garden soon becomes a large as space and purse permit.

The selection of plants to fill a small garden should be even more carefully made than for a larger one, for here we are so limited by space that we must get just the right plants to carry on our production of bloom from spring to late autumn. The lists of available plants, as shown in any good catalog, are very long and complete. From these we have to choose only those which will fill our requirements—long blooming period, good color, and plenty of "pleasable" blooms.

For spring we will be able to have a few of the better varieties of German iris, one or two good peonies and columbine. Then, as the prolific blooming season of summer comes on, we have delphinium, Coreopsis, foxglove, sweet william and alstraea daisies. Then we can carry on through mid-autumn with one or more varieties of phlox—any, pink

Elizabeth Campbell and white Miss Liberty—which bloom until frost time—and perhaps one or two of the—belle, tall, veronica. August means a few clumps of lilies, and in September we are beginning our fall show with Helianthus, Helenium and a few of the real hardy chrysanthemums.

Best Use of Paint
