ENGLAND TO BREAK TIES WITH RUSSIA

Flood Smashes Levee, Drives Out 105,000

25 MILLION NEW LOSSES

Latest Disaster Sends Waters Over Entire Sugar Bowl in Louisiana.

By E. W. LEWIS, United Press Staff Correspondent, NEW ORLEANS, La., May 21. The levee at Metairie on the Atchafalaya river broke suddenly at Metairie today, sending flood waters over Point Coupee parish and flooding 100,000 acres of sugar cane in Louisiana farm land.

No loss of life resulted and state and federal engineers say there would be time for complete evacuation of the parish with its 50,000 inhabitants before it is inundated.

Major Crop Losses.

The newest rash of flood water means inundation of six more Louisiana parishes and the complete transformation of the sugar lands of the state into a gigantic lake.

More than 100,000 persons must leave their homes.

Property loss will reach over \$25,000,000, experts of the state department of agriculture in Baton Rouge said today.

The Point Coupee parish alone crops in the fields were valued at five million dollars.

The break occurred where many thought he had conquered the waters after "flood-busting," the cave-in of the levee was reported by the single telephone wire to report the disaster in Metairie.

Naval engineers equipped with wireless then sent out warnings and preparations were made for a fleet of 300 small craft to start into the lowlands for rescue work.

Practically Exposed.

Practically the entire western area of the parish still is small town and partially covered today and highways were crisscrossed with cars, wagons and stock as the remaining inhabitants moved before the flood.

Major John Gwinn, United States engineer in charge of the Metairie levee, said the waters would probably move slowly.

Point Coupee lies between the Atchafalaya and the Mississippi rivers northwest of Baton Rouge.

Widespread Inundation.

The parishes of Iberia, Assumption, La Fourche and Terrebonne will be completely under water and parts of Acadia, St. James and St. Charles.

DE PINEDO ON MISSING LIST

Plane of Famous Italian Flier Believed Being Towed to Azores.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Colonel Francesco de Pinedo, Italian aviator, who left Tripoli, Suez, Pondicherry, for the Azores yesterday, was missing today but a plane resembling his was reported to be in tow of an unidentified three-man motorboat near Tripoli, according to a dispatch from the report was made by the Radio Corporation of America from Devonport, London, which received it from the Italian authorities. The liner had relayed it from the steamer Offield, which sighted the aviator towing the plane but was unable to call it.

De Pinedo was last reported seen in flight by the steamer London Imperator at latitude 41° 45' longitude 13° 00' the aviator's position, as reported by the Aquitania was latitude 41° 15' longitude 33° 20' between the London Imperator and the Azores.

De Pinedo was scheduled to arrive at Horton, Azores, at 4 p. m. yesterday afternoon daylight. His plane was sighted off Tripoli at 2:58 a. m. eastern daylight time, in the neighborhood of Santa Maria.

Lindbergh Spurs Stage; Wants Old Mailman Position

Cannot 'Picture' - Himself Dancing on Stage; Will Fly Around Europe.

PARIS, May 21.—Charles Lindbergh, famed aviator, yesterday said he would be the guest of royalty in virtually every capital in Europe and that offers of prominence hereinafter to accept contracts ranging into millions, and that the United Press is wanted to do the honors of the world's greatest aviator.

"I have never really felt the air mail," he said. "I think I can do my job."

"I never expect to be on the stage," Lindbergh said. "It is my whole life but probably I may understand another flight like the one from New York to Paris. I am not considering a trans-Pacific trip until I have flown to Europe."

Lindbergh probably limited the offers of lecture business, motion picture incentives and theatrical engagements.

"We understand our flight will have an idea of profit. At present we are considering any offers of lectures and nothing will be done definitely until we return to America."

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With all of Paris crowded for the publicity, Lindbergh's flight plan for the immediate future began to take shape.

"Tomorrow morning I will receive from receipts of presidents and directors of cabinet members in 10 to 12 days. I will then go to London and make sure that the Lindbergh machine which carried him 3,500 miles in 33 1/2 hours is in and complete."

"I will visit the British."

Lindbergh's suggestion that he be something like the Soviet was not taken. He will see it in his own way Saturday morning. He plans to travel in his plane, after Paris a few days to the people look at the crowd, and then wing north to Brussels.

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WORLD GIVEN BY BALDWIN

Will Ask House to Approve Program; Relations Between Two Strained.

LONDON, May 21.—Gladstone Stanley Baldwin announced today that unless the house of commons on Thursday disapproves the government proposal to break official diplomatic and trade relations with Russia, he will resign.

Baldwin made his announcement before the house of commons after having had a long conference with Foreign Minister Austen Chamberlain.

"Unless the house of commons expresses its disapproval Thursday, the government will terminate the trade agreement and relations with Russia and will recall the British representatives from Moscow," he said.

Baldwin told commons that the house of commons should not be the headquarters of the Arctic trading company, a Russian joint venture which had been formed in London and Moscow to sell military equipment and munitions to the entire British empire.

He charged that the raid had revealed that the Soviet was not behind the communist activities in China and that St. Borodin the communist leader in China was under the direct control of Moscow despite recent denials by Livoff and other Russian Soviet officials.

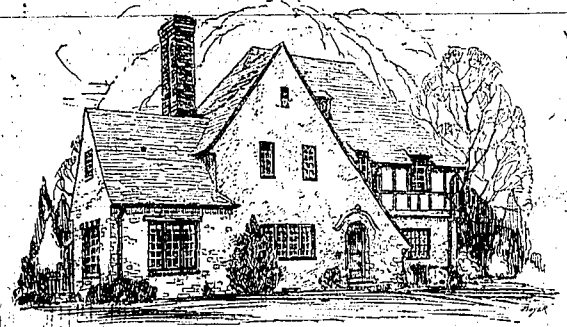
The village forest is operated as a continuing enterprise and is not slashed-down and abandoned, according to American procedure. The result is that the forested, although confined to one of these villages, is confronted with one of the great problems of the times—rising taxes. The best authorities in the United States declare that this sort of thing could be done in this country at small expense. The conservation commission, under expert guidance, has found that it is scarcely likely and difficult to plant trees upon cheap lands which are available to thousands of communities.

Little Falls, Carthage, the town of Watson in Lewis county and a few other places have made substantial starts in such an enterprise, but, considering the quantities such in so many communities and the predicted timber famine, the indifference to the future is really appalling.

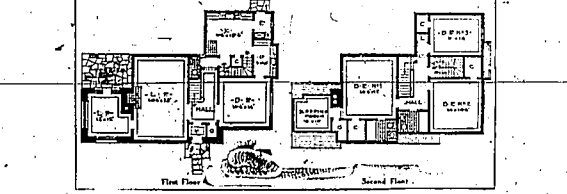

HOUSE AND GARDEN



The exterior of the residence shows above gains interest and distinction the variety of wall textures obtained by the use of stone, brick, stucco and half-timber. The main body of the house is stuccoed, brick and stone present the corners and give weight to the lower part of the facade. Half-timber is used on one section of the second story. Designed to resemble the cottages of England, the exterior shows the result of careful study and planning.

The plan of the house also reflects good architecture. One enters through a small vestibule into an attractive stone hall. At the left is a large, well-lighted living room, beyond which is the dining room. This in turn opens on to the kitchen by a half-timbered brick terrace. To the right of the stone hall is the dining room, connected with the kitchen by a half-timbered brick terrace.

Three bedrooms, two baths—one master's bath connected to the living room and several deep closets make up the second floor.

This house exemplifies what American architects are accomplishing in building homes which reflect in their design all that is best of European domestic architecture in combination with means for providing convenience and comfort to conform with American ideals.

Community Spirit

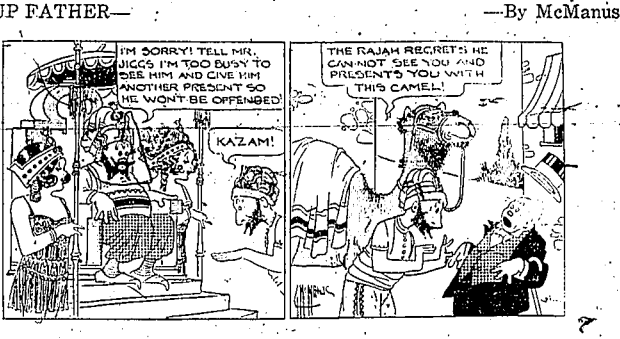

Under Instructions of County Attorney Investigations Are Carried on in Three States; Alleged Identifications of Missing Man in Ashton and Mackay Are Held Mistaken Identity.

On July 25, 1925, was found in the desert which was identified as that of Peters by a brother-in-law and was taken to the next day after an autopsy but without an inquest. About the same time E. H. CANAL COMPANY CROP REPORT IS MADE FOR YEAR

The annual crop and livestock report of the westernmost department of the Twin Falls Canal Company for the last year was made today. It shows an increase of about 1100 acres but not reported on the tract. The total irrigated land this year was 27,750 acres, against 26,848 last year. Total acreage of the tract is 290,745 acres.

Alfalfa acreage decreases from 32,330 to 30,064, but there are large increases in many other crops. Beans increase from 34,622 to 35,879 acres. Sugar beets more than double, from 2,470 to 5,032 acres. Potatoes nearly double in acreage, from 4710 to 8270 acres. Pasture areas decrease from 17,332 to 16,895 acres. Corn increases from 5664 to 7252 acres.

CITY BUDGET IS APPROVED BY COUNCIL

Improvements Have Total Over Last Year, But Estimates Are Cut; Zoning Commission Is Approved.

The city council last night approved the appointment of Austin E. Morse, Thomas S. Robertson and Mayor Richard E. Bohler, who is ex-officio member of the final budget 1929. The council previously estimated expenditures, refused to issue further permits to install street lamps.

The council also voted to increase the salaries for extra officers from \$1500 to \$500. There is an increase of \$1000 in the general fund appropriation, a cut of \$500 in the fire department, a total cut of \$2000 in the city department, a cut of \$500 in the sanitary department and a cut of \$100 in parks.

Has No Power.

That the city has no power to grant permission to install gasoline pumps was the opinion of the city attorney when the matter was put up to him. He said that the question had been asked out of Boise and it has been determined that all such permits were void. The council held that under the circumstances granting of what purported to be a permit might mislead, and that those who installed gasoline pumps must do so at their own risk.

SCHOOL BOARD PLANS REPAIRS ON BUILDINGS

Extensive repairs for the various schools were considered last night at a meeting of the school board which contemplated making the buildings in shape for next year at an early date.
