## AN INDICATION OF ADVANCEMENT

The Times' news column during the last few weeks have carried considerable numbers of stories regarding plow meetings, conventions and other activities of the Grange, the national farm organization.

We find a nice group of people, particularly industrial citizens such as farmers, gets solidly behind a program for advancement, that group sooner or later will meet with success in its endeavors.

The Grange will hold annual meetings at Shoshone, on June 20, and another at Caldwell, June 21, and Louis J. Taber of Ohio, national Grange master, will address both gatherings.

Every farmer in Minidoka, Cassia, Gooding, Canyon, Twin Falls, Jerome, Elmore, Owyhee and Power counties, who can possibly spare the time, should attend one of the meetings. Mr. Taber is a man of wide experience in the farm industry, and that is exactly what farming has become, as much so as the steel, wooden and other industries, to hear his message on the problems of the day.

Mr. Taber undoubtedly will bring a message which will aid the farmers of Idaho, not only in matters of production but upon marketing as well. The marketing problem now is one of vital importance and really is the key which, if properly operated, will open the door to greater things for the agriculturist. The individual, unless he is possessed of far more than ordinary wealth can do very little by himself. Organization upon a program of co-operation is the only method which will result in lasting good. This statement has been made by hundreds of agricultural and industrial leaders and is only reiterated here with the idea of impressing the farmers of southern Idaho with the importance of hearing Mr. Taber.

Even the political leaders in Washington have said that if the farmers had a really helpful organization in connection with the agricultural legislation which failed of passage at the last session of Congress, that program undoubtedly would have become law. While the statements of many politicians must be taken with a grain of salt and it is possible that some of the representatives at Washington may have used the difference of opinion among agriculture organizations as an excuse to wriggle out of being responsible for a farm bill, the truth is that a measure of some sort could have been passed had the agriculturists presented a united front.

The farmers, however, are doing much to solve their own difficulties and the principal objective now is to concentrate on all problems, both production and marketing, to the end that farming will take its proper place as one of the nation's most successful industries.

## FARMERS NEED MORE CITIES

When farming in the middle west was a new thing, the problem was a comparatively simple one. The farmers were as nearly self-sufficient as they could be. They had to buy sugar and salt and some iron tools, but what they wore and what they ate, as well as the houses which sheltered them, were home-made. The land had virgin fertility. The farmers grew more than they needed for themselves and most of the surplus was sent to Las Vegas to feed English and continental mill workers. Transportation was poor, but costs of producing breadstuffs were low and there was little competition.

All that remains of that picture today is the remoteness of the middle west from the export market. The farmer is no longer self-sufficient in the sense that he formerly was. He builds his house and barn and lumber bought from a dealer who may have purchased it from a mill a thousand miles away. He buys cloth made in the cities of materials which he does not grow. His wife cannot spin. He even buys soap and flour. He has no more logs to split for fence rails. He loses his fence from the hardware dealer. Modern machinery has made it possible for him to grow and harvest bushels of wheat than one man could produce in his grandfather's time, but his hand is probably less productive per acre.

Meanwhile the American farmer has met competition from new sources. Since his grandfather's time, Australia, the Argentine and Canada have become great wheat producers. Russian competition, at present not as serious as it might be, is certain sooner or later, to add to the difficulty. At the same time the increasing ease of American life has reduced the per capita consumption of food and the desire to retain a youthful slumber has further reduced consumption.

In these circumstances, it is scarcely remarkable that the mid-western farmers are in difficulties. The situation can be remedied in several ways. One, frequently advocated in these columns, is to reduce the cost of moving farm products from the middle west to the export markets by opening the great lakes and the Mississippi waterways. Another method is to build up the manufacturing industries in the middle west. In the meantime, mid-western farmers, anything that encourages the development of the cities in this region is advantageous for the farmer and anything which discourages industrial growth hurts him.—Chicago Tribune.

What the Chicago editor says, will aid the midwest farmer appreciate also to the west, thus proving the soundness of the claim that the west must put forth every effort to attract more people.
