Scientist Says Seattle to Become Metropolis

NEW YORK—The Pacific Northwest is destined to be the future center of world primary activities, according to a survey of the "scientific probabilities" made by Dr. J. H. S. Smith, professor of economic geography at Columbia University.

Discussing his conclusions in an interview published in American Magazine, Dr. Smith explains:

"The more one studies the factors that have produced flourishing civilization, the more unambiguously becomes a conviction in the future of the extensive Pacific coast of the Pacific coast of Oregon and Washington, and including the cities of Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, Everett, Bellingham, Vancouver and Victoria.

"Based on my assertion on past history and on economic and scientific conditions of today, it is here that expect American civilization to reach its highest stage in the future. It is just west of here, over the mountains, that the advance which the metropolis has had of other cities of the world. In the northwest of which I speak, I anticipate that, man for man, America will reach a higher stage of general achievement, with certain of their greatest physical achievements and scientific and literary achievements in science, literature and the arts.

SOAP IN MONGOLIA FIRST TIME HISTORY

MOSCOW—Mongolians have had their first experience with soap, as a result of a Russian expedition which went from Russia into remote parts of Mongolia.

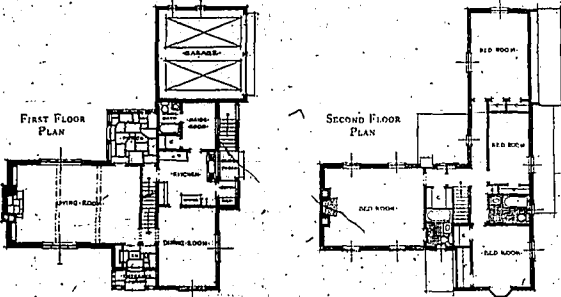

A House of Excellent Design.



HOUSE AND GARDEN



From an artistic as well as a practical view the home presented today is really an architectural gem. Its walls are of solid oak. The roof is covered with slate in shades of blue, gray and green. These dormer windows on the front elevation break up the long roof line and in a smaller way repeat the effect made by the gable roof which juts out at right angles to the house, covering the entrance porch and doorway.

All windows are of the small paneled metal casement type and are framed by oak timbers simulating the English half-timber work. An interesting touch has been given to the porch by the subtle silhouette restraint by the introduction of timber siding.

Perhaps the most individual characteristic of this house is the design of two entrances to the home proper after the house proper has been passed. The door at the left opens directly into the living room while the other opens into a stair hall, the right hand way of which contains a door to the dining room. Opening into the dining room is the kitchen. The main room and bath are at the rear of the house. The garage has been made an integral part of the first floor plan.

On the second floor of this residence we find our bed rooms; one a large master's bedroom containing a fireplace at one end and windows on opposite sides. This room has its private bath while another bath takes care of occupants of the other three bedrooms.

Interesting Experiment In Perennials Is Given

Dear Jimmy: It has always seemed to me that one of the most alluring characteristics of the hardy perennial flower border is the effort it makes to increase and multiply, thus saving from any attempts of yours to assist it in this direction. Once it gets firmly established, each succeeding spring will find its nooks and corners filled with self-sown seedlings seeking an opportunity to grow up side by side with their plant parents and compete with them in loveliness. If you and Pearl will look around now among your perennials you will probably find just this situation existing unless you were fairly careful in preventing the plants from going to seed last season then, I think you were.

There's nothing to be regretted about this habit—quite the contrary, unless you resist the border so hard that it becomes overcrowded by its own occupants. You will find it an interesting experiment to rear the seed of the sturdiest of the plantlets and set them out where they will have a chance to acme in number and in some self-satisfaction. Not infrequently, in borders where there are infrequently colored plants of the same species, the seedlings will develop oddities of hue which will make you very glad indeed that you gave them a chance. Which just goes to show what Nature will do when left to herself.

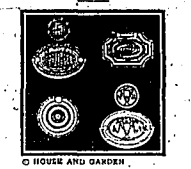

LINDBERGH'S LIFE

The story of America's Hero, the first man to fly from New York to Paris in a non-stop trip.

CHAPTER III.

Self reliance, one of the characteristics of Charles A. Lindbergh, which enabled him to fly alone from New York to Paris and become an international hero, was developed by his early life.

Lived on Farm. There the Lindbergh family lived on a farm on the west bank of the Mississippi river just south of the city limits of Little Falls. It was a farm of the Lindbergh family, being a comfortable one story, white structure, with spacious basement, located on a slight ground, surrounded with trees and woods, and the river nearby.

In his pronouncement, the president appealed to the world to cease using force and war as the method of settling international disputes and to resort to reason and conference as the means of settling them.

Coming as it does less than a month before the Geneva conference between the United States, Japan and England in which these three powers will attempt to work out a program of reducing minor armaments such as secondary ships in the navies, submarines and airplanes, the president's address is being appraised by the world as the most important in the history of the world.

The president's speech carried a true American note but at the same time he sounded a warning to those who would interfere with the rights and property of American citizens either at home or abroad.

While there may be some question as to the scope of interference by American forces in the Chinese and Sino-Russian fields, the fact is that American and American property need some protection at the time those crises arise.

The drift of the whole armament proposition is, as President Coolidge said yesterday, that there will result in the world a considerable number of evil influences which may force war at any time.

This nation would be foolish indeed, particularly in view of the fact that nearly every other country in the world is indebted to it financially, to scrap its navy and disband its army.

After all is said and done, lasting peace will not be accomplished in this age for the reason that enmity and jealousy are human nature.

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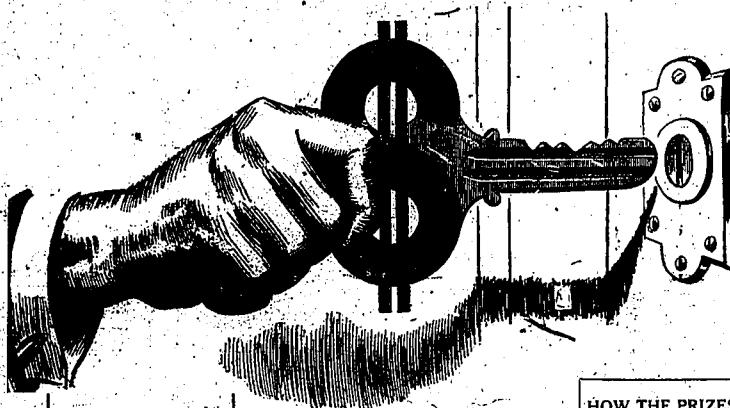

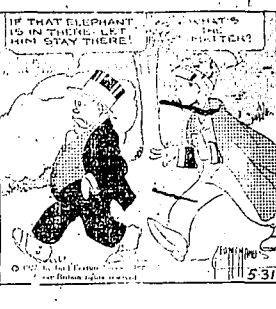

HEAVY UNLOADING CAUSES WHEAT PRICE SLUMP

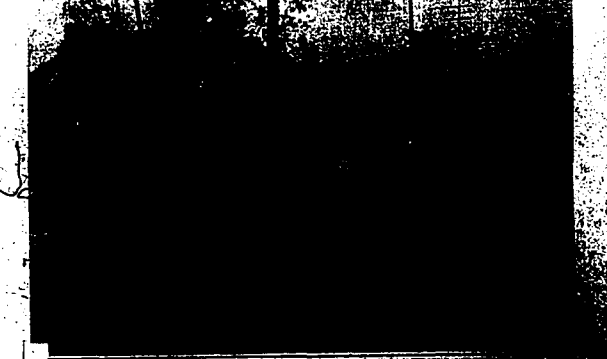
