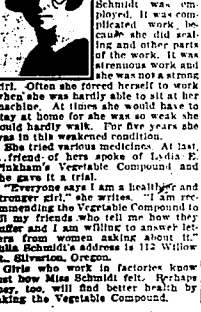

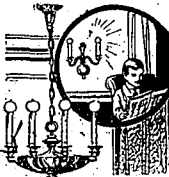

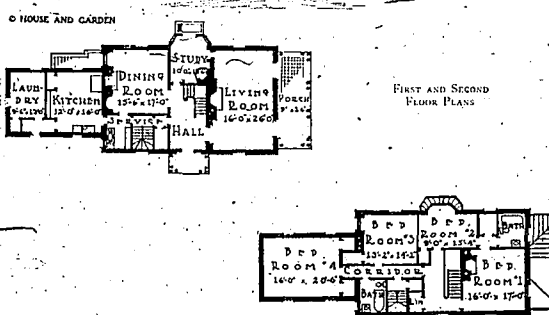

An Eight-Room Brick Residence



In general type the house shown above is somewhat different from the usual run of the residences we see all about us. It is designed on the English Georgian style of building which was in vogue in England at the time the "colonial" heat-away here.

While a brick house has the tendency to maintain a difference especially when, as here, it is built on a square outline, the architect in this case has brightened up its appearance considerably by the charming little trellised porch we see in three places.

An interesting detail in the parapet wall, partly concealing the roof, which rises above brick cornice. The roof is of the hip variety, on all four sides it slopes back toward a central ridge.

The general layout of rooms affords the result of considerable attention on the architect's part to the partitioning of the floor plan. Entering from the front the first attraction is a large living room with a fireplace. At one end of the entrance is a service hall, wherein a service stairway both to the basement and to the second story is found. Through this service hall we enter the kitchen and laundry and also the dining room. The last is the large apartment with fireplace, at the rear of the house. The living room opens right off the entrance hall. A study directly in back of the hall completes the first floor.

How to Apply Garden Spray

Dear Johnny:

The other day I wrote you something about poison sprays to keep the bugs and other troubles out of your garden—how because I don't start the letter long enough before I find time I had to chop it off with out finishing the story. Here's the rest of what I really intended to say, and I'm hoping that it reaches you in time to be of some help.

Ideal spraying weather is clear, stillness and with no prospect of rain for several days. If there is a strong breeze much of the spray will be carried away without ever reaching the destination, and of course a shower coming before the poison has had time to get in its work will wash it off and nullify your efforts.

The water on top of the upper side of the foliage should be covered, and in the case of trees and shrubs, it will make a complete circle so as to be sure that no branch is overlooked. No more need be applied than will coat all surfaces, for it is not necessary to try to drown the enemy. In the case of sucking insects like aphids, it is a wise plan to examine the plants again in a week or ten days after spraying, because by that time a new generation may have hatched out from eggs that were unhatched by the first treatment. In fact, periodical inspection throughout the spring and early summer is an excellent idea, for there is a great advantage in routing insect enemies before they have a chance to do much damage. BUILD IN THROES OF WARM POWER BOND FIGHT TODAY

Mayor on One Side and Council on the Other in Election to Determine Whether City May Purchase Site and Construct Municipal Plant Should Conditions Meet Popular Approval.

Special Dispatch to The Times
DUHL, June 7.—Never since its incorporation, even in the height of that county seat contest, or in any municipal, county, state and national election has there been more intense interest in a campaign here than is being displayed today in the election to determine whether the city should be authorized to issue \$50,000 for the construction of a municipal electrical plant, should a favorable condition be met and approval be granted to the bonds will be given to one or lose by the ratio, dependent on the point of view.

INSPECTION AND IMPROVEMENTS IN CITY TALKED

Council Instructs Attorney to Draft New Provisions Regarding Milk Trucks, Sidewalk Signs, Pubs, Library Suits Wednesday.

Amendment of the present city ordinance relative to milk inspection was authorized last evening on recommendation of the city attorney, Captain E. A. Swobey. The idea is to bring the city regulations up to date and permit more complete and satisfactory inspection.

Another matter of vital importance in the view of the city administration is to determine the exact meaning of the new statute regarding improvement districts. That the old laws governing such districts have been repealed or modified by the new enactment is obvious, but the extent of the modification requires study. The city attorney says, "Under the old law only contiguous property could be included in a single district, special statute permitting the organization out of non-contiguous parts of the city was introduced in the last legislature and killed. Another long measure, covering much territory was introduced and passed but whether the district can be formed of non-contiguous territory, or whether the old law remains unchanged in this particular is not made clear, although the fact constructed seems superficially most plausible."
