"I do not think there was any luck involved in getting Ward but we did have a good break in getting Metzler to take the place of Johnny Moxill in center field. He was highly recommended to us when the Athletics were forced to release him but I didn't expect him to deliver as well as he has done.

"Medcine Ward, McCurdy, and the three star pitchers, Lyons, K. Thomas and Blankenship, apparently, have helped the White Sox club through its now fighting the New York Yanks for first place and one that will likely be the center of all the way if an equal winner.

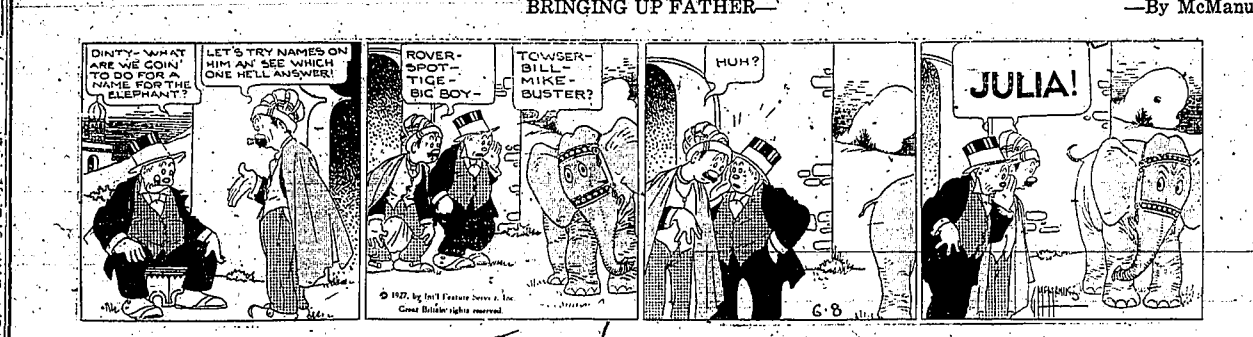

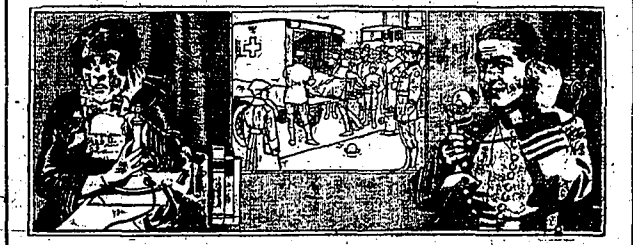
