















## DEAD MAN IS BELIEVED TO BE SUICIDE

Burglary Theory in Connection with Death of Dead Man Found in Rock Creek's Hold Utterable, Phenomenal Report Unfinished.

Officers are seeking today to learn from Portland something of John Paulson, owing to a letter addressed to a person of that name in Portland, that was found in a case believed to belong to the man whose body was found yesterday in Rock creek. Homer Shadley, sheriff, said that afternoon that no results had been obtained so far from tests of parts of the body and that nothing that would be available for a few days. The suicide theory grows apace in circumstances uncovered and to the fact that J. A. Young saw a person answering the description of the dead man. That officer, who had been at the spot where the coat and hat were discovered, said he would be available for a few days.

Search instituted at 2 o'clock yesterday for the coat and hat, the post mortem led to the discovery of a coat and hat near the Rock creek water edge, which laid the foundation for the suicide theory. The body was found Wednesday afternoon in the creek half a mile below where the coat and hat were found. It is believed that the coat belonged to the dead man, as it was of the same material as the trousers found on the body. The coat was of the color of the trousers and the lining of the coat in the pocket leads to the belief that the man may have committed suicide.

Shortly after the class of the post mortem was over, it was learned that the body had been found in an orchard carefully along the creek bank until they arrived at the spot where the coat and hat were discovered. A boy, whom they were told had been in the pocket, the boy had a \$2 gold coin as an ornament. A box of snuff and a letter were also in the pocket. The letter was written by the boy, and stated that the theory that the man was killed for the purpose of robbing him, officers believe. The sum of \$420 in all was found in the coat and hat, the body, but since there were evidence that a watch had been worn in the trousers pocket, it was surmised that the boy had taken the money and grabbed the watch, without warn-

search the pockets for the change. May He Shadley.

The letter was written in Norwegian and was addressed to John Paulson and was signed by "John O. Paulsen". On the lines were some signatures in Swedish, which were transcribed by C. E. Lind. The signature was signed and transcribed in handwriting, in search of a name.

"Forget me" and "So all this" closed the note. The letter inside was merely a story of travels of a workman.

The dirt on the bank of the creek was disturbed as if the man had fallen into the water after removing his hat and coat.

## HIGHWAY BOND CASE WILL BE TRIED SHORTLY

The Oregon Short Line is ready to try the Clark County highway bond case now pending on final hearing in the federal court. Involving constitutionality of the law levying the bond, the case will be heard when the defendant is prepared and Arthur Blair of Spokane, associate of R. W. Katerford, of Clark county, has agreed to represent the plaintiff. It was stated yesterday by H. B. Thompson, attorney for the Oregon Short Line, which brought the original action.

The railroad company was not attacked on constitutionality of the validating acts. Mr. Thompson said the issue was raised by the answer of the defendant. After the interrogatories were filed, the court issued a ruling which held the issuance of bonds under the old law unconstitutional, the case was delayed for a month.

In the meantime, the defendant, the Clark county district, then raised the point in its answer by observing that the laws passed by Oregon were unconstitutional upon which the court based its ruling that the old measure was unconstitutional. This brought the question up again, but the court said it had been some talk of instituting suit in the state courts to test the law as this had not been done.
