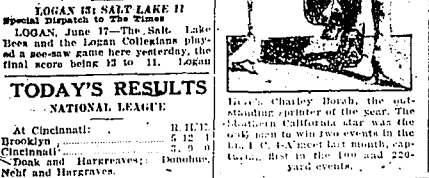

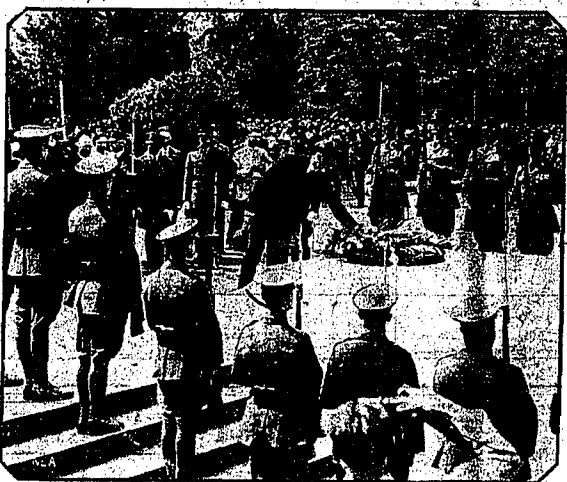
DEAD MAN IS BELIEVED TO BE SUICIDE

Robbery Theory in Connection with Death of Person Found in Rock Creek Is Held Unfavorable, Journal Report Unfurnished.

Officers are seeking today to learn from Portland something of John Paulson, owner of a letter addressed to a person of that name in Portland, that was found in a coat believed to belong to the man when body was found Wednesday in Rock creek. Homer Saxton, chemist, said this afternoon that no results had been obtained so far from tests of parts of the body and that nothing that would be available for a few days. The suicide theory grows calmer on circumstances uncovered and to the fact that J. A. Young saw a person answering the description of the dead man Tuesday afternoon going toward the spot where the coat and hat were discovered Thursday afternoon.

Search instituted at 2 o'clock p. m. yesterday, following the close of the work morning, led to the discovery of a coat and hat near the Rock creek water edge, which held the foundation for further definite identification of the identity of the man whose body was found Wednesday afternoon in the creek half a mile below the spot where the coat and hat were found. It is believed that the coat belonged to the dead man, as it was of the same material as the trousers found on the body. A note on the back of a letter which looked like the handwriting of the man may have committed suicide. Shortly after the close of the morning the officers went to the spot where the body had been found and searched carefully along the creek bank until they reached at the spot where the coat and hat were discovered. A watch which had been found in the pocket of the coat was also in the pocket. The finding of the watch works in favor of the theory that the man was killed for the purpose of robbing him, officers believe. The sum of \$4.20 in silver was found in the trousers on the body, but since there was evidence that the watch had been worn in the trousers pocket, it was surmised that somebody, outside, had struck the man and grabbed the watch, without val-

Son of George Thilston, of Twin Falls, Here on Visit, Instantly Killed When He Drops 100 Feet to Rocks Below.

Shelby Thilston, 21, of Hopkins, Minn., son of George Thilston, of this city, was instantly killed at 2:40 o'clock Thursday afternoon, when he fell 100 feet from the top of the Salmon Dam river canyon, and fell 100 feet to a ledge below. Companions with the aid of ropes and the assistance of others, near the dam, brought the body to the top of the canyon edge and it was brought to the Blue water.
