SALT LAKE CITY, June 29.—Bill Apperson's club of the Utah Indians caught the second successive day's victory yesterday and walked off with nine runs from the Utahs, 9 to 5.

Collecting a total of 18 bingles, including two-base blows by Andy Alving, Hoag and Apperson, the Bruins started the bottom of the ninth on the march by putting on three runs in the first and two in the second. Salt Lake then went ahead when Flynn followed for a fourth by scoring through the fourth one in the fifth and one in the sixth.

Utah's pitcher, however, turned on the heavy artillery in the seventh frame when they scored two more, added two in the eighth and one in the ninth. The last three runs came on Hoag's double with the bases fully populated.

Flynn, who hit for the Bruins, pitched a good game, except in his ninth, when he was hit by two home runs and a double. He walked seven men.

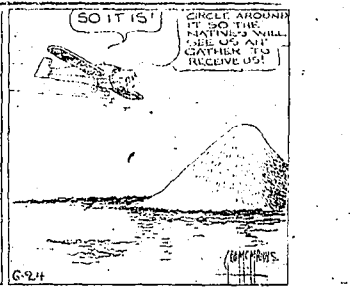
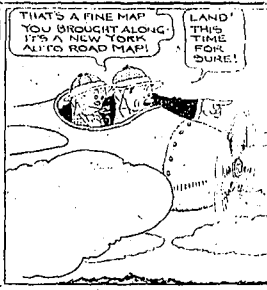
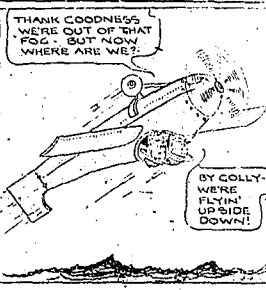
