# FORBIDDEN TO ATTACK JEWS HALTED

## U. S. to Enlarge Navy if England Rejects Terms

### BRITAIN'S STAND IS MYSTERY

Responsibility for Possible Failure of Geneva Meet Up to London.

**By United Press.**  
LONDON, July 8.—(Specials)—The British government's attitude toward the Geneva conference on naval disarmament is a mystery. The administration definitely declined to agree under any conditions to a total-cruiser tonnage of more than 35,000 or 40,000 tons, a maximum for Great Britain and the United States.  
No Signs of Receding.  
Much to the surprise of Washington, the British have not receded from their demands for 71 destroyers, totaling from 50,000 to 60,000 tons. The present British "minimum" cruiser including ship hulling, is 20,000 tons, compared with 9,000 tons for the United States.  
The administration is prepared, if Britain forces a break to adopt the four-nation plan.

England Cannot Change Stand, Says Lord Bridgeman; Blames U. S.

GENEVA, July 8.—(Specials)—The complete success of the League of Nations naval limitation conference here was materially lessened today when Lord Bridgeman, first lord of the British admiralty, told newspapermen that he could not change his policy with regard to cruisers.  
Bridgeman placed the blame for the present crisis squarely on the United States type of cruiser, he said, at the Washington conference on the 10,000 ton type of cruiser which Britain, against her own needs and wishes, to construct this maximum type.  
Britain has been demanding cruiser tonnage in excess of the amount approved by the United States.

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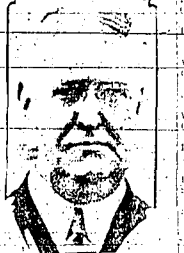
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# JOHNSON RESIGNS AS A. L. PRESIDENT

## THE FASTEST AIRPLANE

Only six feet of air separate the plane from the ground. Motor roaring, it flirts with the earth. Gracefully, lazily, it skims closer, thrilled so low that a fast motor car could outstrip it. It buzzes—rises again, wheels spinning from the contact and swirls circles the field. Now it lands. Another, it "sits down." Instead of bumping or jolting along the ground, it glides to earth and stops within a few feet.

Such was the first public test recently at Mitchell Field, N. Y., of a remarkable new fighting airplane, the Sea Hawk, built for the U. S. navy. The plane's ease of maneuvering at slow speed, and its hydraulic wheel brakes, indicated that it could land directly upon the deck of an airplane carrier. Yet when it "took" these powerful motors it opened its wings and became a speedster of an hour.

The Sea Hawk is called the fastest plane in the world equipped with an air control motor. Embodied in its construction are a thrust back lower wing, enabling the pilot to fly his landing gear down without disturbing wing construction, and curved upper wing, to avoid danger of the heavily tail spin. It can be converted in a few minutes into a sea plane by the addition of pontoons. Under the cooling fan two main floats, which rise through the propeller, are attached to the fuselage.

Novel safety devices—features sacrificed to speed and maneuverability in fighting planes—are provided. A button in the cockpit, in case of fire, sprays extinguisher fluid on the engine. A valve empties the gasoline tanks into the sea in an instant. And a rubber lifebelt is within reach of the pilot, provided with built-in inflated rubber cushions that can be inflated in an instant.

## MOVIES OF IDAHO

Moving pictures of Idaho scenes, and notably of wild life in our mountain retreats, will prove a big asset when shown in the middle west and north. They have already performed their full share in selling recreational Idaho to big game sportsmen, and to tourists, who will come in numbers and spend their squares and funds within our borders.

We should not underestimate the amount of money that can be attracted to our state by the scenic magnet. The impulse to get into the wilds is strong with us. We live nearby. How, much more so with those who are cramped in cities or who live in the mountains.

Those people will spend large sums if they can see something of nature, level to fishing and hunting and big game country. Moreover, a percentage of them might possibly become interested in the industrial life of Idaho and invest. A splendid way to get them into our country is to put before them attractive slides displayed through the movie and in every other way possible.—Donna Telle Tribune.

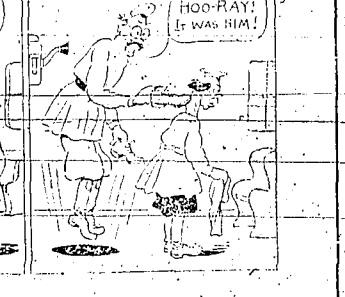
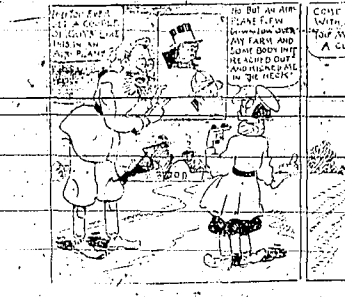
