## \$2,500 CHECK NOT REPORTED BY EXECUTIVE

**Little Black Box Yields Sensation in Indiana. Scandal Probed.**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 11.—A check for \$2,500 payable to Ed Jackson, governor of Indiana, and an attached note stating the amount was part of a \$10,000 contribution to the governor's primary expense has been found in the "little black box" of D. C. Stephenson, former Ku Klux Klan leader, the Indianapolis Times said in a copyright story today.

The check—dated July 10—concerns evidence in the Indiana political investigation which has been in progress for 10 months. No contribution of \$10,000 from D. C. Stephenson was noted on the complete expenditure sheet filed by Governor Jackson.

The law provision that all expenditures and receipts must be detailed and the alleged irregularity on Jackson's part lies in the fact that the Stephenson contribution of \$10,000 did not appear on Jackson's complete account.

The check was cancelled, the Times said, and dated September 15, 1937. It was signed by Stephenson and made payable to Jackson. The attached note stated that the money was for a copyright story today.

The note, the Times explains, was in Stephenson's handwriting. Stephenson, at that time was the grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan of Indiana. In 1932 he was convicted.
