## MOTION PICTURE ARTISTRY

Eugene Zukow prophesies the development, possibly in several directions, of a higher degree of artistry in the movies. Despite the tremendous popularity of this form of entertainment a certain section of the public will doubtless second his prophecy with a hearty "Speed the day." That there is room for a great deal of artistic development none will be likely to deny. And there ought to be. The amazing thing about the movies is not that there is so much that is stupid and trothy, but so much of excellence has already been achieved in this infant art.

The art of motion picture making is not only so new that you can still see the price tag on the hem of its coat, but it is unique art. There is no like in the history of other fine arts to guide its development. Essentially it is a creative art. One man may write a great book, compose a great symphony, design a great building or mould a great statue and ordinary skilled printers, musicians, masons or stone cutters can be employed to present them to the public. The making of a great motion picture requires the mutual effort of scores of specialized artists. The scenario writer, the actor, the director, the cameraman are but a few upon whose perfect understanding the artistic success or failure of a picture depends.

There is no cause for wonder or complaint that out of the innumerable elements which enter into motion picture making up Michael Angelo, no Shakespeare, no Michelangelo has appeared. To take the place with the others of the old masters, this new master must be one who in synthesis the abilities of the great with his ability to hold in fusion his emotions, union all the multitudes of losses, whose joint effort is necessary to give it life.

This forthcoming genius has been supplied with wonderful tools with which to work. On the mechanical side the motion picture has well nigh reached perfection, despite the talk of new wonders of photography and projection to come.

His greatest difficulty lies in the fact that he must prove finally certain and must convince others that his great work will be commercially successful. The making of a great motion picture is not a mere matter of starting in a garret while waiting for recognition. It requires the investment of a fortune. It is under this must combine with his other talents the ability to attract a large public taste.
