ANOTHER WELCOMED ACTION

PUTTING THE ISSUE TO COOLIDGE

Senators Norbeck and McMillers, of South Dakota, yesterday visited the summer White House and frankly told President Coolidge that the best stands solidly for some form of farm relief.

SAYS 1927 WEATHER TO EQUAL 'COLD YEAR'

That those changes, caused by the sun reaching the maximum in its period, have had effect on the climatic conditions for the past six months throughout the entire hemisphere, is shown in the various weather fluctuations.

The influence of ocean currents on the winds, which in turn have affected the climatic conditions, are responsible, in part, for the unusual weather for the first six months of 1927, which is comparable to that of 1926, which was a cold year.

The temperature of sea and water areas, he said, still remains dominant in their zones, leaving the tropical waters and those of the semi-circled bordering seas to bear the brunt of maintaining the warm winds sweeping the hemispheres of the continental areas.

The interference for cold winds generally from winter, which is precipitation widely across the North Temperate zones, Brown believes, "is generally the result of the waves before the beginning of fall, although the intensity of each local effect is not yet determined."

Reduction of barometrical gradient between cold and warm areas will inevitably see a slackening of the winds blowing between the two areas. FIRE-FIGHTING IS DONE EFFICIENTLY BY PARK RANGERS

Motor Driven Pumps Weighing 70 Pounds May Be Set Up in Short Time

Special Dispatch to The Times YELLOWSTONE PARK, July 16.—Rangers of the National Park section of Yellowstone National park are prepared to fight forest fires in any part of the park. The fire fighting equipment made by the ranger force clearly demonstrated that fire protection in the park is on a par with that maintained in many of the large cities.

The fire fighting apparatus features two motor-driven pumps, both of aluminum construction and weighing about 70 pounds. These pumps are so constructed that they may be carried on a pack harness by one man and the weight is no greater than the average army pack. As was demonstrated in a recent drill, a pump of this type may be set up in the bank of any stream and started within a few minutes. A crew of two men in the last test ran had two pumps operating and a hose line of 250 feet laid within six minutes after the start on the scene.

MEDICAL STAFF IS MAINTAINED FOR TOURISTS

Well Trained Physicians and Surgeons Ready to Care for Sick.

Special Dispatch to The Times YELLOWSTONE PARK, July 16.—Hospital care is maintained in the Yellowstone National park for the tourist of protection of health. The medical staff includes two well-trained physicians and surgeons of wide experience and more than a score of trained nurses. A trained nurse who works under the direction of these physicians is stationed in every hotel and lodge in the park with a medical dispensary at all times and is always ready to answer the sick or emergency call.

In the case of an emergency operation, an ambulance completely equipped with latest type shock absorbers and special stretcher springs, carries the patient to the hospital in the delivery from one station to another. A fully equipped operating room, attended by competent surgeons and nurses, supplies to the tourist service which usually is rendered in the case of an emergency call.
