

# LINDBERGH LOST IN EASTERN FLIGHT

PORTLAND, MAINE, July 23.—(UP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh was lost in a heavy fog over northern New England late this afternoon. Lindbergh, who took off in the "Spirit of St. Louis" at 12:30 p. m., was due to arrive here at 2:30 p. m. At 5 p. m. the plane had not arrived and welcoming officers and throngs of sightseers waited impatiently. Officials were frankly alarmed at that hour, although it was known Lindbergh carried enough gas to remain in the air 10 hours, and it was believed even if he were helplessly lost in the fog he could cruise at a high altitude until it became safe to land.

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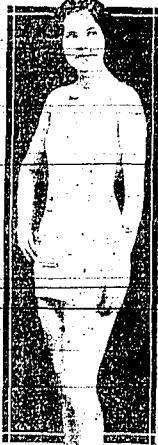

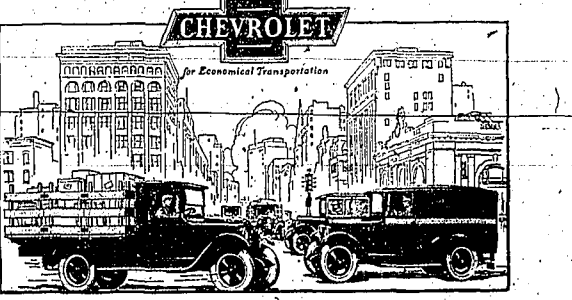

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# ANNUAL TOLL BRIDGE PROFIT REACHES TOTAL OF \$100,000

### Total of 7,847,220 Cars Crossed Bridge in First Year, Yielding \$2,132,000; Annual Profit Amounts to \$100,000.

A total of 7,847,220 vehicles paying \$2,132,144 in tolls, passed over the Camden bridge in the first year of its existence which ended at midnight on June 30. The earnings were approximately \$2,132,000, the highest amount estimated for the first year by traffic experts and engineers.

The second year began unobscuredly with a Fourth of July week-end in which approximately 140,000 vehicles passed over the bridge. Toll collections for that period totaled \$33,552.39. The busy traffic, which was at its peak on Tuesday, when heavy vacationists crowded the bridge, was accompanied with a heavy rain.

Bridge manager Joseph K. Costello points proudly to the new toll booth, the most profitable thousand-dollar per day in the world. Far from showing a deficit on investment in interest and maintenance expected in the first year, the span has shown a net profit of \$100,000. And this despite the fact that maintenance of the great span costs more than \$100,000 a day.

The great success of the bridge has been a surprise to all. It is an annual booster and possessor of the fact that it will open up its way and eventually be toll free. The latter part of the campaign is being made a free bridge at the expiration of seventeen years. Now the same experts, revealing their confidence in the basis of the first year's traffic and earnings predict a free bridge within twelve years.

There are still some sceptics even among the members of the Delaware River Joint Commission. And this is the North Jersey member of the body. At a recent meeting of the commission Theodore A. Bostetter, Hackensack, speaking for the North Jersey Commission, favored an increase in tolls, saying he would not expect if the bridge would be toll free within the seventeen years.

Bostetter's proposal looked upon as a move to make Camden Bridge so successful in its first year that part of the cost of the tolls be shared between New York and Manhattan. Bostetter linked the two together in his argument. He said a \$30,000,000 bond issue. Of this \$20,000,000 would be for the bridge, \$10,000,000 for the tunnel and \$10,000,000 went for the bridge. The majority of the commission held that each traffic artery must pay for its own share of the bond issue.

The tunnel agreement between New York and New Jersey calls for the payment of the same amount within twenty years, the Pennsylvania-New Jersey bridge agreement no date by which the span must be paid for.

**Increase in Toll Rate**

An increase in the toll rate for buses has been made effective. Single deck buses now pay 50 cents instead of 40 cents. The double-decker rates increased from 40 cents to 75 cents. At the same time, the agreement with the Pennsylvania-New Jersey commission, which provides for a preferential rate of 25 cents for single-deck buses and 40 cents for double-deck buses was abandoned. That company is the only operator of double-deck buses.

The preferential rate was granted last year, when the transit company guaranteed a minimum toll company of \$100,000 within the year. At that time this was believed to be a hazardous offer. The company actually arduous offer. The company actually did pay \$175,000 in the twelve-month period. But this total was exceeded by the payments of \$190,000. The new rate will mean an additional \$250,000 in revenue next year, according to bridge engineers.

The rapid growth of bus transportation between South Jersey and Philadelphia has been one of the year's surprises. During July, 1926, the first month of operation, the bridge officials collected \$1,125 from P. R. T. buses and \$5,600 from independent. In May, 1927, with the increased rate, the Philadelphia Rapid Transit had paid \$12,000 in the summer. P. R. T. payments were \$1,825. Collections from independent buses had increased to \$2,500. An average of 3,600 buses now cross the span daily according to 30 per cent of its revenue. The Philadelphia Rapid Transit had been in consultation with the bus business by bus companies independent of the bridge. Two buses were purchased in July.

Camden Bridge in its first year has equalled the estimates of bridge engineers for its fourth year of operation. The bridge's success is almost reached. The \$2,327,500 estimated for the fifth year of operation is no indication that the traffic in coming years will fall in proportion with the first year's business.

**Record Daily Collections**

Our highest collection for any normal traffic was \$100,000 for Sunday June 26. I do not take into account the \$100,000 collected on the bridge, when we did our greatest business. The highest collection of Pennsylvania and New Jersey motorists crossed the span to inspect it. They drove over the bridge on July 6, 1926, a Monday. The day's collections were \$114,311. Traffic Tuesday morning in Philadelphia was larger than on Monday. The rush July 22, 1927, the holiday rush Tuesday morning brought 12,000 cars over the bridge.

# MILLIONS PASS OVER NATIONAL OLD TRAIL ROAD

**By United Press**  
 KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 23.—Millions of tourists this summer will pass over the Old National Trail from San Francisco to New York, and most of them will know that the trip, smooth whenever they travel, was once an over-the-hill traveler who saw heavy machinery over the road so far in an hour in his time as he did the overland in two days, with an old horse and harness, that every mile he had to make of such toughness and roughness as the death of their muscles.

Starting from Kansas City, the traveler passes eastward through the beauty of the rolling hills of Missouri, and in and out of the capital cities of St. Louis, Indianapolis and West-Virginia.

Rivers that gained fame through war or peace to some will be crossed as the tourist travels eastward. The Missouri, the Mississippi, the Ohio, the Wabash, the White and the Ohio water in Indiana, the Miami and the Scioto in Ohio, and the Richmon in Massachusetts at Zanesville, Ohio.

At Zanesville, the road splits into two, one to the north and one to the south. The northern route is a bygone era, begins, passes through the market stopped at Cleveland, then through the mountains of Pennsylvania, where James Whitcomb Riley was born. After passing Zanesville, however, the Blue Ridge mountains begin and the traveler finds relaxation in the little mountain hamlets.

**YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., July 23.**—Work on the road oiling project in Yellowstone, which will when complete, make the Grand Loop Road a dustless highway, is progressing rapidly. The road from the northern entrance of the park, a stretch of more than fifty miles, is now completed and trucks of 500 gallons capacity are outfitting the highway with 5,000 gallons daily. It is not possible to make an accurate estimate of the average mileage covered each day as the width of the road and other conditions cause a fluctuation in the amounts used on the different sections. When the project is complete the Yellowstone Park will be able to boast of more than 100 miles of oiled highway.
