NEW YORK, July 25.—The last hope of averting a strike of employees of New York and elevated lines apparently faded today when the Metropolitan Rapid Transit company discharged 111 workmen who were members of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Railway Employees.

Some 1,000 men were discharged for refusing to instruct applicants for positions in connection with operating the new line to Queensburgh, general counsel of the I. R. T. reported. The other five were reported to have been discharged merely on the grounds that they were members of the Amalgamated.

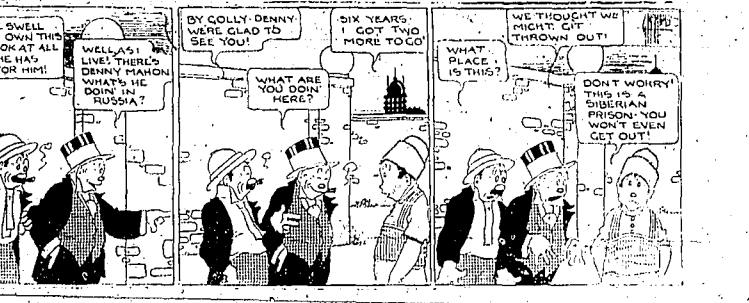
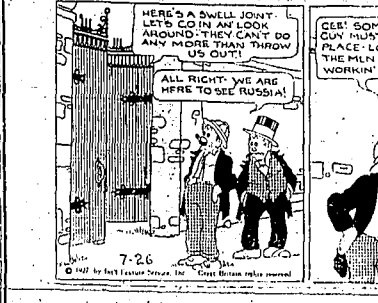
