OPEN PROBE OF LAKE DISASTER

15 of Chicago Dead Are Children Trapped in the Murky Waters.

CHICAGO, July 29.—Twenty-seven bodies of victims from the excursion boat Favorite had been recovered today by officials of the dead to fix responsibility for sinking of the small steamer.

Fifteen of the dead were small children. Ten were women and one man was drowned. Divers searched the bottom of Lake Michigan near the place where the vessel went down for additional bodies.

The little boat, on which some 75 persons embarked yesterday, had been called early today by search crews who worked throughout the night to bring it to the surface.

Patrols have been kept on the small steamer captured in a small mill race between the Chicago Municipal pier and Lincoln Park.

The crowd aboard was composed almost entirely of women and their mothers who had paid a quarter for the trip in the cooling lake breeze—a brief while from the excursion boat which crippled the city.

News of Great Disaster in China on May 23 Reaches Outside World; Tragic Suffering Grips Thousands of Homeless

LONDON, July 29.—United Press—A hundred thousand Chinese were killed in an earthquake on May 23 in the remote province of Kansu, China. Missions reported, vice apostle of the Sacred Mission at Liching, Chong, reported in a letter to the Shanghai correspondent of the Westminster Gazette.

Will Work World.

The evangelist stated that she had received calls from more than 60 of her branch churches complaining that she spent all her time on the Pacific coast and urging that she spend three or four weeks in each city.

"My thought is to make Angeleno temple the headquarters and center of the world-wide activity," she said. "This will necessitate having an associate pastor so that I can feel free in spending a portion of my time in the field."

She made no announcement concerning the extent of the absence, but with her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy.

The controversy between mother and daughter over control of the temple, which for the past week has threatened to wreck the temple, was ended today.

NOT ACCEPTABLE

GENEVA, July 29.—The British proposal for the settlement of the cruiser problem will hardly prove acceptable to the American and Japanese delegates, and the early closing of the naval limitations conference was generally predicted today.

No final action will be taken here, until the plenary session set for Monday. Meanwhile, the American and Japanese will study the new proposals in more detail, while the British, if they decide will have something to say, will announce their proposals to satisfy the American and Japanese.

The proposals now before the conference, submitted by the British on July 27, include a maximum of 10,000 tons for all other cruisers to six inches.

Great Britain and the United States would be permitted a maximum tonnage of 500,000 for cruisers, submarines and destroyers; Japan 350,000 tons.

In addition, each nation would be allowed to retain 25 per cent of the total in obsolete tonnage, but not more than 10 per cent of the maximum tonnage.
