BUFFALO CALF SPURNS MAN'S KIND EFFORTS


Rejects Ranger's Advances of Friendliness; Other Animals Tame.

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., July 30.—Park Ranger Roy Frasier of the Buffalo corral near Mammoth Hot Springs in Yellowstone National Park has a collection of his own in the shape of a small, tame, one-year-old calf, a young antelope, a deer fawn and a buffalo youngster, all in the vicinity of a mud hole.

The young antelope, is the tallest of the lot and would, if allowed, follow the ranger "anywhere." The elk calf and the deer fawn are also very tame, while the ranger, in whose care both fawns were placed after their mothers had deserted them and left them to shift for themselves, is the most tame of all, and more affectionate around him than they are usually around Ranger Frasier, with a lot of milk, forthcoming.

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AGITATION FOR ABOLISHING OLD GUILLOTINE GAINING IN FRANCE

There is increasing agitation in France for the abolition of the guillotine. The official executioner of the state is still at work, but no one is now prepared to work, and it is now used only for a few, and with "the widow" of sanguinary memory in favor of another method of carrying out the death penalty.

In this historic contrivance passed in favor of a more modern method, there will vanish from the scene an instrument that in its day took a greater total of lives in a short space of time than any other punishment device.

A popular song first brought the guillotine to public notice and attention to its use, and it was written by a benevolent physician. He was not its inventor, but had before the Revolution advocated a machine for executing. In those former times himself nearly escaped the guillotine in the final days of the Terror. Only a general staff officer of the army of the Rhine, from his being a victim of "the widow" which had taken its toll of such figures as the King and Queen of France, Charlotte Corday.

It is likely that the guillotine would never have sprung into the prominence it later received had it not been in the time of revolution. It is quick and painless, and can be used on masses. Elected as one of the representatives of Paris in the National Assembly, Dr. Guillotin suggested to that body that under his new penal code, criminals should be executed by decapitation by a machine. It was a period of party factionalism, and a Bostonian, the Rev. John Shinner, president of the Polytechnic School, recommended to the National Assembly that the machine be introduced, and both the Church and State, according to a statement of Professor of England and the Non-Conformist John Shinner, president of the Polytechnic School, should be used.

Guillotine Takes on Saxon

Guillotin talked with Saxon, the official executioner, about the possibility of using "the widow" in the new capital of France. In the name of the Captains, he was told that "she" seemed to have been a jovial enough fellow, addicted to the violin, and to duets with a friend, Tobias Schmidt, in the basement of his house. Schmidt, according to Saxon's version, soon drew up a plan for a decapitating machine and offered it to Dr. Guillotin, who received it with a box of Saxon's secretions, which directed its construction. For a time the guillotine was known as "the Louis XVI," in honor of the man upon whom it was based by a physician and destined by a manufacturer of pianos.

Strictly speaking, the first guillotine was not built in France, for the early form of it was known in Italy and had also been used, although sparingly, in Scotland and Switzerland. The Swiss, however, did not wait for the establishment of capital cities in 1791. The height of the Terror came, and the Guillotine was installed in the Tuilleries, the Paris mob, itself, was not yet around it, but hired by the gentry. They model guillotines were worn as dress ornaments by the women of Paris, and the children, too, were fond of them, though not for the sake of the children, they walked in the streets.

So simple was the mechanism, so easily could it work, that it undoubtedly contributed greatly to the judges increasing the number of aristocrats who passed beneath it. It came to be a political weapon used by men in power over their enemies. While it was set to a half dozen or more persons in Tuileries, the guillotine is principally associated with the tragic Place de la Revolution, now
