## Six Aviators and Passengers Killed in Three Week-End Plane Accidents

### C. Chamberlin Flies From Steamer at Sea in Test for Reducing Ocean Passage Time

By United Press. CURTIS FIELD, NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The first of three week-end tests to show how two days can be cut off the traveling time between New York and Europe succeeded here today when Clarence D. Chamberlin landed in a Fokker triplane at 3:20 p. m. in the air harbor.

Chamberlin took off from the decks of the liner Lovington 100 miles and flew through to Long Island. "Hardrock" flight, "N. J." was his first test flight but because of the poor visibility he found the field here a better landing place.

## RADICAL WETS AND DRYS ARE MAIN PROBLEM, CLAIMS NEW SECRETARY

Hotter, Efficient Enforcement of Prohibition Law on Same Basis With Other Statutes is Promised by Lowman As He Takes Andrews' Job.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Bernard Lowman of Illinois, N. Y., arrived today as assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of prohibition, customs and coin guard, declared "my greatest job is to hold down the activities of the radical wets and the radical drys."

Lowman issued a formal statement: "Temperance and sobriety are commendable virtues. We want a sober America."

Special Organization. "General Andrews is turning over to me a splendid organization for effective work. The coast guard and the fish and wildlife service, both of which have been greatly neglected, are making very different improvement under my direction."

Lowman is looking for honest, efficient enforcement of the prohibition law, that the same as other United States laws, which will not be tolerated in the prohibition service, I have no political bias.

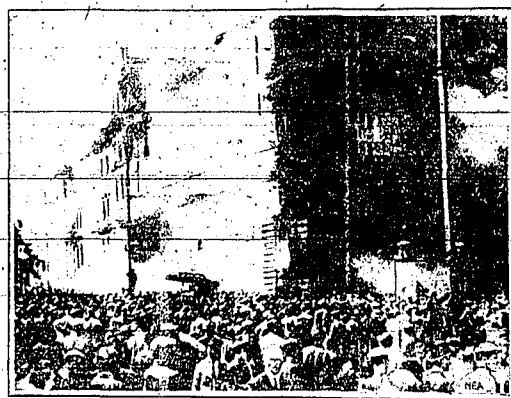
