ASHER B. WILSON DECLARES PROPOSED RATE CUT ON WHEAT WILL GIVE NO GREAT AID TO FARMERS

Tariff Workers Will Continue Efforts; C. of C. Head Believes Rate Should Be Slashed Additional 10 Cents; Sees Confusion for Growers.

Talk on freight rates continued today to be an absorbing topic about Twin Falls. Yesterday's statement by F. E. Ogden, freight agent, in which he said Ogden was fighting the Union Pacific's suggestion to cut the rate on the Wells-gateway road from here to California points five cents below the rate via Ogden, brought forth a statement from Asher B. Wilson of the chamber of commerce.

Mr. Wilson, who is president of the chamber, declared his meeting that the proposed cut will not benefit producers here to any extent, because it is not large enough. He looked upon the five-cent cut as a means of opposing California's fight with Oregon to have grain shipped to California.

TO CONTINUE FIGHT

Although several of the most important freight rate reductions to date have been made, they do not indicate that they will continue their fight, averring that no noticeable benefit will come from the small reduction.

The chamber of commerce president presents the following statement:

"The proposed reduction in rates on wheat from the 1000-mile point to the coast will not be such a rate as will benefit the local wheat market. If the rate would be cut another 10 cents, we might then gain some benefit from such a rate."

He then directed in that the announcement of the five-cent reduction was made only to confuse the producers of this valley into thinking that there is a general fight that they are striving to have here.

Continuing his statement, he said: "I think that you feel that you did a good thing in sending your delegations down to continue their efforts in assisting Sherman M. 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CHEVROLET CHIEF TO RETURN FROM EUROPE IN TWO WEEKS

William S. Knudsen, president and general manager of the Chevrolet, the steamship due at New York Motor company, is scheduled to return about Aug. 16 from the tour he is making of Europe. He traveled more than 10,000 miles in his extended ladder and plane. The extended plant tour trip to continental Europe, which Copenhagen-Knudsen and Berlin included a visit to his former home, which like the American plants, are run on a 24-hour basis during the first six months of this year these three plants turned out more units than during the entire year of 1926, thus attaining in the overwhelming favor of the European market, which is finding among European buyers.
