SUPREME COURT TO GET CASE

Propose Delaying Pacific Race 2 Weeks

SOME AVIATORS
MAY DECIDE TO
DEPART ANYWAY

Fliers Are Not Prepared for
Long Jaunt Is Opinion of Committee.

HONOLULU, Aug. 11.—The Hawaiian committee in charge of the race from the mainland to Honolulu scheduled to start from the Pacific coast on Aug. 15, today officially voted the abandonment of the postponement of the flight for two weeks as requested by the San Francisco committee.

HONOLULU, Aug. 11.—Three entrants in the Pacific race today from the usually prepared started planning for the event at the executive session of the Honolulu contest committee here.

They were John Augie Poddar, Michael Martin, Jameson Hough and Major Wellington Irving, members of the San Francisco committee.

"Poddar will start tomorrow or withdraw tonight," William Molokoh, his backer, told the committee.

Major Irving sent a cable expressing his opinion and favoring the start as originally scheduled at noon tomorrow.

Nanking was captured several months ago by the nationalistic forces under General Chiang Kai-Shek. Since then, however, the nationalistic factions have split into left and right wings with Chiang at the head of the right wing.

Shanghai also held by the nationalistic, was not being endangered for the present.
