WOOL-GROWERS HEAR DISCUSSIONS OF VITAL FREIGHT RATE PROBLEM

Asher Wilson and Sherman Coffin and Several Others Talk on Question That Is Stirring This Tract; Pass Resolution Concerning Appointment.

The wool growers in basins, at the "Pack" held last evening, heard with much interest the matter of freight rates to and from this state. Both Sherman M. Asher B. Wilson followed with his talk on rates, emphasizing the fact that to compete with outsiders Idaho must have rates comparable to those affecting others shipping to and from Portland. He also urged the opening of the Twin Falls-Ketchikan route.

Out of the little red, six-wheeled, motor-driven car, Sacco, Vanzetti, and Celestino Madrona, whose execution was the subject of the trial, were taken to the electric chair.

A bright summer sun shone upon the scene as they moved on their strange journey to the comparatively cheerful "Chamber of Death."

At 10:30 a. m., the mild-mannered Italian man, who had wanted to die as a martyr, to the cause of radicalism, refused to have the execution of his fellow who marked him as an inmate of the death house.

At 11:30 without look appeared to have had but slight effect on Sacco and he walked with firm tread over the path that led him back to his former cell.

Vanzetti, the philosophical philosopher, who had been accompanied by the three doomed men back to their old cells, he talked with them.

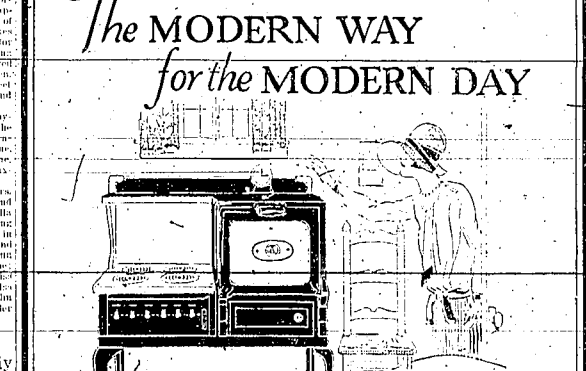

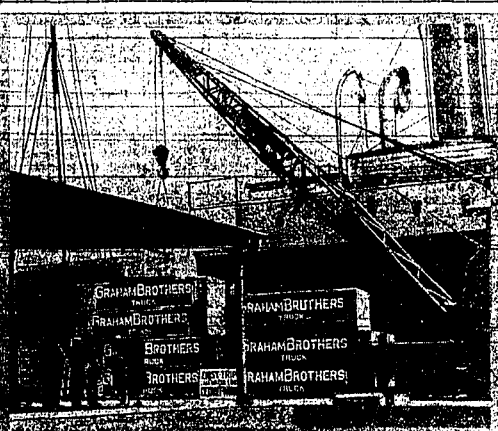

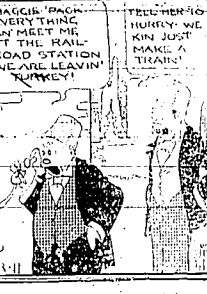
