TRIPLE-A GROWING FAST

South Idaho Membership Increases 1,200 Per Cent in Recent Months.

A MILLION YOUNG FOLK ROMP ON PLAYGROUNDS

Over Ten Thousand Recreation Fjolds Are Maintained by 790 of Our Cities—Music and Roaming Theatres Play a Part in Entertaining Youthful Crowds.

More than a million boys and girls are engaged in similar recreation activities in the United States every day this summer. Last year 790 cities reported that they were carrying on organized recreation activities. To separate play areas under leadership of 5,641 of which were outdoor playgrounds, 1,285 being of the permanent type and 4,356 of the temporary variety.

At first, it is said, playgrounds were built over ten acres at the front and the sides of the city. They were considered only as places where children of congested districts might get fresh air and exercise. Their purpose was not strictly physical, but when the war playgrounds have been added for other things as well. Music in parks, plays, and dramatics, and the drama follows a close behind. Of the 270 cities reported last year, 20 had dramatics on their playgrounds and 217 had dramatics. Community singing was a playground feature in 225 cities, bands in 182, orchestras in 134, toy symphonies in 55 and music necessary contents in 55.

Music is said by many leaders to have brought a more wholesome attitude to the playgrounds, a more intimate acquaintance with the children and an increased sense of responsibility on the part of the city officials only. The harmonica, too, has been revived. When the playgrounds in Chicago first got a harmonica content on the program only two instructors in the public schools and one in the city were found who knew anything about the instrument. They E. H. ROUNDUP ISLAND PONIES THAT ARE WILD ON VIRGINIA COAST

Season Is Here When the Tiny Horses of the Virginia Islands Are Rounded Up and Sold; Their Origin Is Unknown.

Before setting out for America, the Spanish collected, for purposes of breeding, a band of the Moorish usually dark brown and have long, heavy and Arabian horses. The horses were taken aboard the Spanish ships upon which they came to America. They were mostly landed in the "wild" coast, where they were driven off by the owners and abandoned. The Chintheague ponies are mostly black, but had the "wild" horses which all colors may be found among them.

Once a year there is a roundup of the beach ponies on Chintheague Island. Though the horses run wild, they are not public property.
