**FREE U. S. FUELERS CHALLENGE SEAS**  
**Washington Insists Mexicans Return Seized Mines**

**DEMANDS LIVES OF AMERICANS BE PROTECTED**  
 Mexico Expected to Take Quick Action to Avert Diplomatic Crisis.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 27**—The state department is prepared to insist to the Mexican government on the return to American owners of the Amaro-Misson (near Manzanillo), Jalisco, Mexico, officially reported to have been "red syndicates," or unions.  
 A memorandum the department expects the Mexican government, at the request of American Consul Schoenfeld, to afford military protection for the Amaro-Misson and other mines in the state. Fear for the safety of those foreigners continued today, despite assurances of the Mexican foreign office that their situation is "adequately" protected.

**WATER PARLEY HITS NEW SNAG**  
 Colorado River Conference Draw New Terms for California-Arizona Fight.

**DENVER, Aug. 27**—Bitter in their attempt to arbitrate differences between California and Arizona over division of water from the Colorado river, representatives of the four upper-basin states attended the Denver water parley today, drafting another proposal.  
 "Will modify, possibly," the new proposal has been presented to the two states this afternoon.  
 George H. Durn, chairman of the seventh state conference, announced after the morning session that the plan now at hand between California and Arizona will be modified in an effort to arrive at a satisfactory solution to the long-standing difference.  
 The principal differences between the two lower basin states remain the same today as it has been since the new upper basin proposal was presented.  
 The new demand is for 1,000 cfs of water for the Indian land; California opposes this demand. It states further it can agree on allocation of tributary water. Both claim a major portion of such flow.

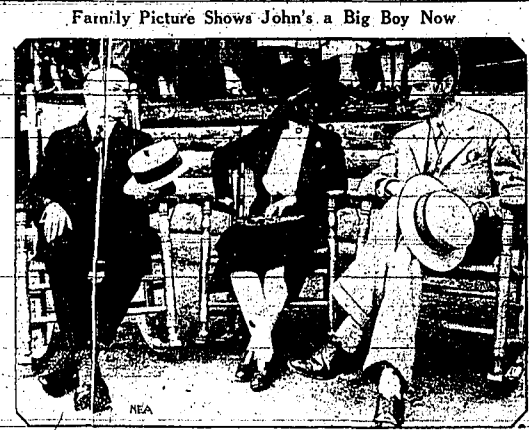

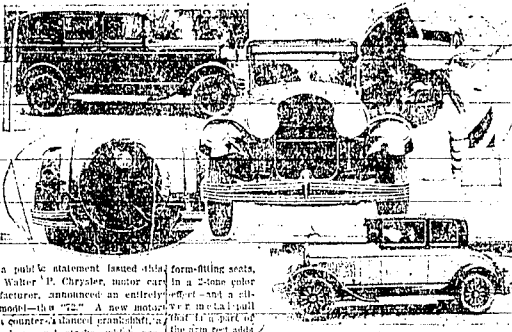

# INDUSTRIAL EXECUTIVE URGES ABOLISHMENT OF MOTOR HORNS

## He Declares They Are Not Always Safe and Believes Highway Accidents Would Be Less

Automobile horns, ordinarily approved as a safety measure for heavy traffic, have been a universal complaint says C. T. Stone, executive of the Buick Motor Company, that he now believes if they were removed entirely from the automobile the result would be a marked decrease in automobile accidents.

"Without horns" he points out, "it would not take long for every one to realize that safety depends on hearing the horn and eye contact which is, after all, the only and complete remedy for accidents. While admitting that horns do occasionally prevent accidents, he also states that they have become a nuisance driver with a false sense of security which often leads carelessness and results in accidents.

"If automobile owners would try to drive their cars with the horns removed," he says, "they would find that they would drive with more care than they had ever, close along their first experience as drivers. Drive two blocks through traffic without the use of the horn and you will find that you are using more care than you have ever before to avoid accidents. You will drive as you should always drive with the regard for others who are on the road."

**BUTLER SAYS HE

"Some of these are in the fields of literature and perhaps the advances of modern science represent one of the brightest present day manifestations of the imagination."

"It never occurred to me," Dr. Butler added, "to make so silly a statement as that there is no genius now in the world."

Dr. Butler said that he would now have thought the subject up again except for the reason that he had received seventy-five editorial notices more than two letters from all parts of the United States and wished to have it dropped.

**SHELL MAKES  
NEW DISCOVERY**

An exhaustive series of experiments conducted by the Marston refinery of the Shell company of California has demonstrated conclusively that there is no advantage in the use of gasoline by using heavier distillates, said J. G. Kramer, of the Shell laboratories here.

"It was thought until recently," explained Kramer, "that heavier distillates which give so much trouble in the motor were a factor in increasing mileage because of their possessing more heat unit, but our experiments, confirming those of Dr. George G. Brown of the University of Michigan and other authorities, prove beyond question that this is not the case. The reason is doubtless to be found in the fact that heavier gasoline runs with less hydrogen and has a lower heating value per pound, it being well known, for instance, that gasoline has a higher heating value than fuel oil on the pound basis."

"We have, in fact, succeeded in adding materially to mileage by using, in a three-cylinder, five-cylinder, and six-cylinder motor, more than two liters from all parts of the United States and wished to have it dropped."
