Levine in England
Charles A. Levine, passenger in the monoplane Columbia on its flight from New York to Germany, flew away from Le Bourget field, France, alone today and alighted at Croissy air port, France, and announced he would fly to New York alone if the weather permitted.

Captain Leroy Tully and Lieutenant James Medall, who left London, Ont., today to fly to London, England, turned back and alighted at their starting place after a short flight.

Paul in Germany
MUNICH, Germany, Aug. 28.—William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee arrived at 4 p. m. from London, England, on the second leg of their proposed flight around the world in the monoplane, "Pride of Detroit."

OFF TO U. S. SOON
