

19 CHILDREN PERISH IN MISSION FIRE

WINNIPEG, Manitoba, Sept. 21.—(By United Press)—Nineteen children of the little Roman Catholic Mission Bevaual at Lac la Plonge and Sister Lea were burned to death when the mission was destroyed by fire, according to word brought here today by persons aboard the mission launch. The launch arrived at Big River, Saskatchewan, where first word of the tragedy became known. The cause of the blaze has not been determined. The mission Bevaual burned to the ground on two previous occasions.

AIR RACERS NEARING SPOKANE GOAL

TWO ARE OFF FOR NON-STOP SPIN TO COAST

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 20.—The non-stop flight from New York to Spokane, features event of the annual "Spin to Coast" races and Spokane air derby, started this afternoon at 5:30.
At 8:01 p. m. Eddie Stinson's orange colored monoplane "Fisher" took the "Spin to Coast" race, raised gracefully into the air and headed west for Spokane where Stinson expects to set his dinner tomorrow.
Only once has a non-stop flight from coast to coast been made.
Stinson first flew.
Promptly at 4 p. m. the starter's flag dropped Stinson's monoplane and the machine roared away. It lost momentum as it left the runway but gathered speed as it whirled along and after a dash of 3000 feet went into the air again.
As Stinson's plane faded from view E. A. Duke's "Schlizer" monoplane "Royal Windsor" started its starling position. Its motor roaring and its pilot exhorting by the starting flag the first flight of the "Spin to Coast" race was off at 5:18 p. m.
There were about 1000 persons on the field to see the take-off. They cheered and waved as the planes got under way.
Quick delivery.
Schlizer's plane took a run of over 1200 feet before it left the ground, 30 seconds after the starter's flag was dropped.
Schlizer lost no time in circling the field, striking the automobile head-on straight west toward the runway.

COAST FLIERS OFF IN RACE

11 Aviators Dash From San Francisco for Spokane For Large Cash Prizes.

MILLS FIELD, SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—The San Francisco coast air race started shortly before 7:00 p. m. today with ideal weather conditions reported by government forecasters along the route of the 600 mile flight.
An original start of 11 was out to sea and 10 withdrew. Arthur Emmons' "Eagle" took the lead, was changed in an accident shortly before the field and E. A. Duke failed to report with the international plane in time for the take-off.

FIERY WORDS SHEEP PARLEY

California Rejects New Plan for Settling Colorado River Water Dispute.

DENVER, Sept. 21.—California refused to accept less than 4,000,000 acre feet of water from the lower basin of the Colorado River, brought back words at the seven-state conference here today.
After Charles L. Childers, attorney for the Imperial Irrigation District in California, had read the state's answer to the upper basin proposal, a document containing 15 pages, Arthur DeGalarza, head of an anti-irrigation league, declared to answer the state proposal, that it had been considered more carefully.
The action of the two states precipitated a fiery address by Gov. Frank E. Smith of Wyoming, who charged that California was "lying her face in the sawdust" and that California had "made a million-dollar mistake."
The conference decided to give the Arizona delegation until 10 a. m. tomorrow to submit her reply. The upper basin proposal has indicated they could have more time if needed.

Cleveland, Sept. 21.—Two pieces of antique tape may be the deciding factor in the court battle over the proceedings of Mrs. Sam Smith to force a maternity hospital to produce the infant she declared was replaced with a girl.
Phillip Volmer, superintendent of the hospital, said the tape would be the key to the case.
Volmer said attorneys for the institution would push their case on the fact that both Mrs. Smith and the baby girl have adhesive tape identification marks which check in all but one detail.
Both pieces of tape, he declared, have the number "30" and the words "Baby Smith" written on them. He admitted that through some error the identification tag on the infant showed the word "male".
Three babies having the name of Smith, two boys and one girl, were born at the hospital within a few hours of each other. Mrs. Annie Smith, wife of Mrs. Alice Smith, and other two mothers, lady boys and a baby they have the right child.
Mrs. Sam Smith declares that the baby boy was born to her and later was substituted for girl.
Miss Ruth Meyer, who was present at the birth of the baby to Mrs. Sam Smith, will go on the stand tomorrow when the hearing is resumed. Luther Day, attorney for the hospital, announced Mrs. Meyer who is being held incommunicado until the hearing opens, has been quoted as telling hospital authorities that Mrs. Sam Smith declared that she was the mother of the child.

HUGE ECONOMIC RAILWAY STEP COMING BEFORE NEXT CONGRESS

WASHINGTON—One of the greatest of the economic steps planned for enactment by the Seventieth Congress this winter is railroad consolidation, which has been seriously discussed for 30 years and considered the major transportation problem of the nation for the last six years.

A bill for voluntary consolidation of railroads in the public interest and repeal of the 1920 Transportation Act provision for an arbitrary consolidation plan will be reported to the committee by the Interstate Commerce and foreign commerce committee, which has spent several months drafting the measure.

President Coolidge and the interstate commerce commission have repeatedly asked congress to enact such a law. The bill drafted by the committee has been studied all summer by railroad leaders, and early tentative hearings under direction of the chairman, Rep. James Parker, Republican, New York, had drafted a measure. The senate commerce committee likewise held extensive hearings on the same problem, and is prepared to act specifically on the proposals presented.

The bill, according to its own language, advocates and authorizes voluntary consolidation, through purchase of property, lease, stock ownership or other method.

The commission's desire for enactment of the measure is grounded partly on the fact that the present law prohibits actual "consolidation" and its strict provisions have caused denial of permission to several roads to effect widespread unifications of mergers, including the Van Sweringen-Nickel Plate unification. Under the law, mergers cannot be granted unless they conform to the prescribed plan, and in the absence of the plan, the commission will continue to exercise full authority over the railroads. In putting through the voluntary consolidation which the bill would authorize, the commission would (1) ascertain if the plans proposed carry out the spirit of the bill; (2) would also grant the consolidating route exemption from taxation un-

"I am convinced that the policy of voluntary consolidation is sound," says Rep. Parker, pointing out that some of the greatest railroad lines in the country, including the New York Central, the Pennsylvania, the Union Pacific, the Atchafalpa, the Norfolk and Santa Fe, and the Atlantic Coast Line, were formed by the consolidation which started after the Civil War and continued until the Clayton Anti-Trust Act stopped them a little more than 10 years ago.

To guarantee all stockholders a vote, the bill provides that all holders of outstanding corporate capital stock involved shall be given a vote in the consolidation operations.

BACK-HOME POLITICS TO CALL STATESMEN FROM NEXT SESSION

WASHINGTON—Active politics back home will start the 1938 campaign before the seventieth congress gets half way through its session this winter.

Completion of the dates for selection of delegates and nominees for national conventions and offices to be filled by the November, 1938, election means that many members of congress will be compelled to mount the stump at home. Instead of their comfortable senate and house seats, during much of the session.

Under the favored South Dakota primary law, party precincts will elect "preprimary men" on the second Tuesday in February. These proposals must meet several times in succeeding months to decide on platforms and candidates for July from president of the United States—on down, but the primary election generally is counted as the nation's first political indicator. A direct primary is held in May on candidates.

Seventeen states will hold direct primaries in March, April, May and June, and direct delegates to national conventions, which meet in June, and likewise usually to instruct the delegates.

These states and the dates of their primary election are as follows: New Hampshire, March 6; North Dakota, March 20; Michigan, April 2; Wisconsin, April 2; Illinois, April 10; Nebraska, April 10; Pennsylvania, April 23; Massachusetts, April 27; Ohio, April 27; California, May 3; New Jersey, May 15; Oregon, May 18; West Virginia, May 23; South Dakota, May 23; Florida, June 5.

The senatorial primaries in prospect are as follows: Pennsylvania, David A. Reed, republican, incumbent, April 23; Nebraska, Robert H. Howell, April 23; Maryland, William Cabell Bruce, democrat, May 7; Indiana, Arthur Robinson, republican, May 8; New Jersey, Edmund J. Edwards, democrat, May 15; West Virginia, J. M. Beck, democrat, May 23; Florida, Park Trammell, democrat, June 5; Maine, Frederick Hale, republican, June 15; Minnesota, Joseph Shipstead, republican, June 15; North Dakota, Loren F.razier, republican, June 23.

Montana, Burton K. Wheeler, democrat, July 17; Texas, Earl B. Mayfield, democrat, July 23; Missouri, James A. Reed, democrat, August 1; Virginia, Claude A. Swanson, democrat, August 7; Tennessee, Kenneth McKellar, democrat, August 15; Ohio, Simon D. Fess, republican, August 14; Mississippi, J. D. Steele, republican, August 21; Wyoming, John H. Kendrick, democrat, August 21; California, Hiram W. Johnson, republican, August 28.

The terms of 21 democratic senators, ten republican and one farmer-labor, are in this list.

The ten republicans include several administration critics, J. D. Steele, Kenneth McKellar and Hiram Johnson, who are expected to be featured, on the part of their aid in the campaign, by extensive series of attacks on the Coolidge administration, from all sectional and national angles which offer themselves as victory points.

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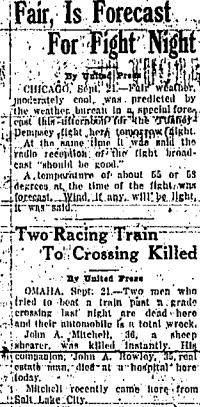

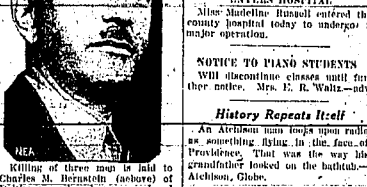

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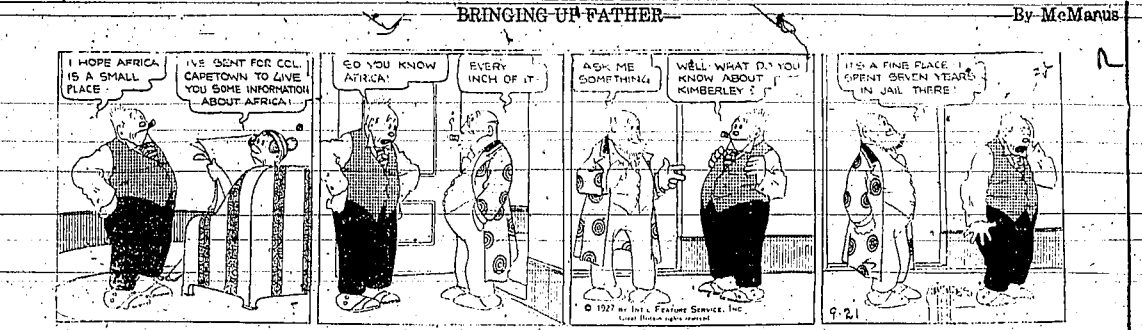
