Tex Rickard's Luck Seems Holding True to Form on Weather; Illinois Commission Keeps Its Choice for Referee Secret Until Last Minute.

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—Another of the million dollar spectacles which Tex Rickard has managed to hold together in the huge Soldiers' Stadium, when Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney meet in a return match for the world's heavyweight championship.

In betting this morning, Tunney is a 6 to 5 favorite to regain the championship he won from Dempsey in the waterlogged ring last year. The odds are not so high as they were in the first fight, but they are not so low as they were in the second.
