





# SPUD DIGGING DUE NEXT WEEK

### Average of 75 Carloads Day Shipped From State in Past Week.

Diets of the main crop of Idaho potatoes in the southern part of Idaho will be on full swing by the first week of October, reports Wendell Calhoun, representative of the Federal Market News service, who is in the office at Idaho Falls, today. He said that the shipment of 46 cars of potatoes from the state during the past week, making an average shipment of 75 cars a day, marked the beginning of the active movement of the late crop.

He reported that the greater part of these potatoes were burials from the Twin Falls, Idaho, district. Burial sections and from Fort Hall, Aberdeen, Blackfoot and Shoshone. Some of the early burials have been coming from the southern part of the state.

Growers are now hoping for another crop sufficient to sell the state, and that the potatoes will ripen and also to make digging easier, the state, he said that the frost during the middle of the month cut the vines rather heavily in a few sections but throughout most of the state they were only partly killed, and the crop is still making size. Some sections report more than the usual amount of rough stock, said Mr. Calhoun, but for the most part the quality promises to be excellent.

Prices to growers at Idaho loading stations have been around 75¢ a hundred weight for sacked burials of U. S. No. 1 grade, and \$1 to \$1.10 for sacked U. S. No. 1 burials, or 75 to 90 cents bulk, depending on the warehouse operators, the price varying according to the maturity of the stock in loaded cars. The demand has been rather active the past few days on burials at 80 cents, with a few best up to 85 cents. Burials have been in only moderate demand at a range of \$1.05 to \$1.25 in carloads according to maturity.

**Shipments Show Decrease**  
Idaho potato shipments in the amount to 2,110 cars, compared with 2,590 a year ago. The Caldwell-Sampa section with 200 cars has also decreased in total shipments of last year of 710 cars. Southern Idaho, from Burley to Bluff, has shipped 750 cars so far this season, which is about the same as last year. But in the upper Snake river valley the crop has been later, with the result that 400 cars have been shipped this season to date from this district north of Pocatello, compared with 520 cars a year ago. Total shipments from this section for last year amounted to nearly 10,000 cars while the Burley-Bluff district shipped around 5,000 cars. But in southern Idaho showed a greater increase in acreage this year. It is expected that the total movement from the two sections from the 1927 crop will be about the same, probably amounting to from eleven to twelve thousand cars each. This would make total shipments from the state of from 22,000 to 26,000 cars, compared with the total for last season of 17,324 cars.

## New Pamphlet on State Is Now Out

Special pamphlet to The Times BIOHISL, Sept. 20—Advance copies of the new agricultural booklet entitled "Idaho," compiled by the Idaho state chamber of commerce, have been prepared by Ralph E. Thomas, secretary of the organization. It is anticipated that the booklet will be used primarily for circulating outside of the state in the chamber of commerce's campaign to interest new settlers in the state.

The booklet is devoted entirely to the agricultural industry and covers in detail thoroughly, grain, fruits, vegetables, hay and cereals and farm livestock, all enjoy their respective shares in the book. The publication is illustrated with half-page pictures which prove Idaho to be among the foremost agricultural states of this country.

The printed matter is in the form of questions and answers. The first few pages deal with the physical characteristics of the state including location, size, resources, population, irrigation, rainfall and principal agricultural crops grown. Continuing through the pamphlet the reader learns about Idaho's railways, highways, its fruit production centers, the dairy, industry, poultry raising, the success of co-operative marketing in the state, educational facilities, development of mining, hydro-electric power and other subjects, all of which co-ordinate with the work of the farmer in producing wealth from the soil. The remaining pages are devoted to a concise description of each county in the state. This description contains the names and populations of the principal towns, the main agricultural crops and the various resources and activities carried on there.


