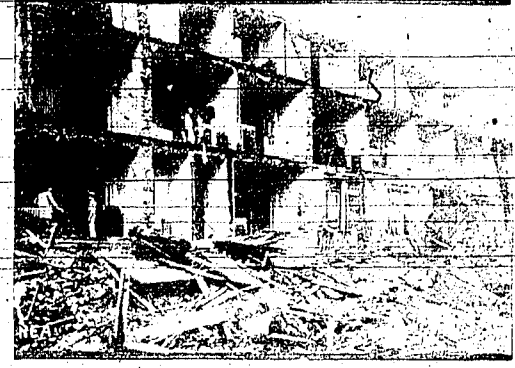

(The Times published the first picture of the storm damage yesterday.)



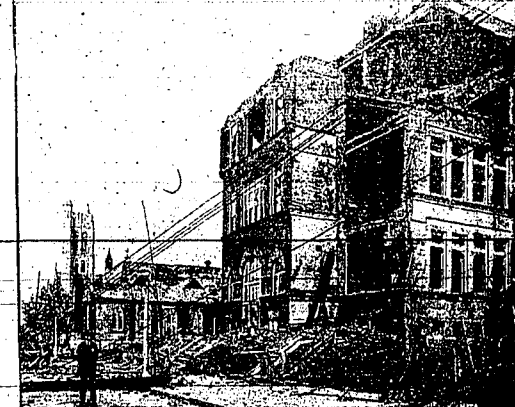
General view of the central residential district where the tornado damage was the greatest and many lives were lost. More than 5000 homes were destroyed.

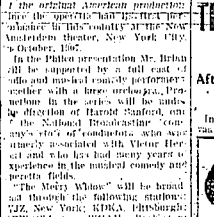

PATRON SAINT OF MOTORISTS SOUGHT DAILY

Down through the centuries this saint has been especially revered by travelers. With the advent of the automobile, revolutions in the means of travel began to be carried by motorists. They are now carried by aviators as well. A shrine in honor of him being erected at the motorcade of Monthley, near Paris, in a tower a loud speaker will be used to invoke protection for racers and for motorists and others who attend.

For seventeen centuries travelers have called on St. Christopher to see them safely to their destination. Down through the ages, his image has been carried by the heart of footsore pilgrims on penitential visits to Rome, not even today his protection is despised—the devoted who speak about the earth-finesse of penitence and flood as well in fact in almost every public calamity—the aid of the "Christ-bearer" has been sought.

Like many of the saints of antiquity, Christopher is most widely known through the legends that have grown up about him. The chief established facts are that he lived in the third century and that he won a martyr's crown. But legend makes his life a vivid one and the same legend explains his posture in pictures. Christopher, according to tradition, was the son of a wealthy Roman Christian mother. He was given the name Offereus. From an early age he had remarkable strength and was in his maturity reached twelve feet in height. One day attributes striking beauty to Christopher from his babyhood; another makes him a hideous monster until his conversion to Christianity.

The life of the Saint. When Offereus reached manhood he went forth in search of a maid stronger than himself, whom he vowed he would serve. His first lover was a king whose reputation as a strong and fearless man was widespread; but when Offereus found that the king lived in mortal fear of a beauty to whom he was devoted, he decided that the deed must be still more powerful and accepted Satan's employ. But Satan broadened the aim of the cross, and as Offereus left the ranks of the demons. A horned banded "Tabyris" invaded the peaceful Christian and baptized him. Offereus' cruel bulk and height offered him a way of escape. He was converted and spent his life ferrying people across a shallow stream on his shoulders. As the legend goes, one day a child one day came to Christopher and asked to be carried across. Christopher lifted him to his shoulders and grasping his staff, started across the stream. 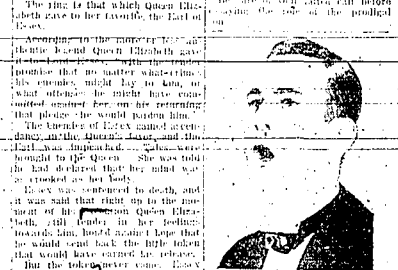

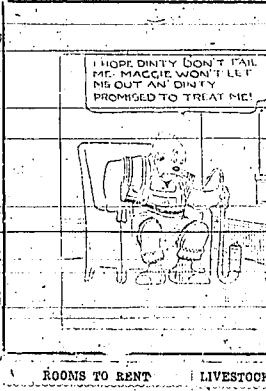

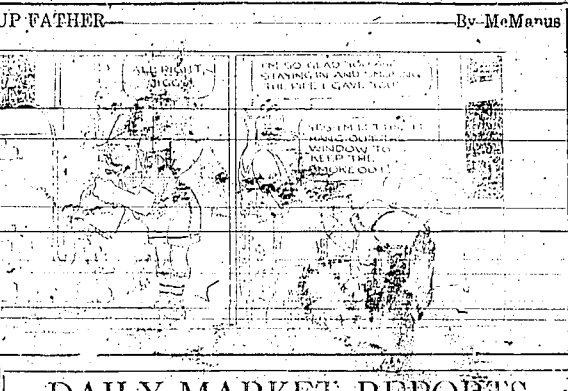
