Mexican Rebels Making Final Stand

FEDERALS TRAP ENEMY FORCES ON MOUNTAIN

Annihilation of Gomez and Almada Troops Is Expected in Battle Today.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 7.—On the cheetah summit and up the densely wooded slope of Cerro de Perote, a mountain, 12,416 feet high, rebel forces under Gen. Arnulfo Gomez and Gen. Almada Almada to day took their last stand against overwhelming odds.

Confidence in their ability to hold out until the outcome of the battle was evident in the words of Gen. Gomez:

"Federal troops, a point of greatest strength, are holding the fort, dominating from its heights the cities of Perote, Jiquilpan and Orendia.

Rebels disintegrated.

The federal forces here, outnumbered in the hills two to one and were equipped with all the means of modern warfare, including airplanes for scouting and attack, armored cars, machine guns, field pieces, the mountain on which the rebels have been trapped can be reinforced by the entire Mexican army.

HUERTA SLAIN IN REBEL TILT

Brother of Former Mexican President Is Victim of Federal Troops.

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, Oct. 7.

Alfonso de la Huerta, brother of Adolfo de la Huerta, the former provisional president of Mexico, was slain in a battle with federal troops 12 miles south of here today by the victorious federal cavalry and planes in exhibition in the public square.

In addition, according to a report, 400 Yaqui Indians, who were sweeping through Sonora and destroying communities, were captured or scattered by superior force of federals.
