
















It seems that the bold gang should have been detected sooner between the first and last place it entered, but the fact remains, that larger burglaries have been "pulled" in much larger cities than Twin Falls. However, seven thefts in one night are too many, on the other hand, it is a fact that some places of business are not as careful as they should be. The police report of doors and windows found open after closing hours would tend to confirm that statement. And it must be remembered that the present police force consists of only four men for the 24-hour period.

There is a certain element of the youth and some of the older persons of this district who believe they are immune from the law and this is another problem which must be given consideration in connection with any move made here to hold crime.

Action toward increasing the number of officers will undoubtedly be prompt and certain if it is felt something must be done to help. In itself the apparent attempt to make Twin Falls the main target for criminal purposes is most misleading. Every individual strike is all that is required, but, on the other hand, the officers must not be singly criticized if they happen to fall "victim" enough to shoot up another once in a while. ## AT LAST!

The United States supreme court has spoken, and, as a result, Harry P. Sinclair must turn back to this government the Tepio oil fields in Wyoming which were leased to him by Mammoth Oil company several years ago by the then Secretary of the Interior Alvin E. Ball. The court has cancelled the lease, declaring that it was apparently obtained through conspiracy.

Without going into the details of the lease investigation, with which everyone who has followed the case through the long years is prone, probe, probe investigation and lawsuit, it must be said that the public in general is relieved that the controversy has come to an end. The least said, the better and this is said in view of the opinion handed down by the supreme court and delivered by Justice Butler. The best way to comment is to quote his words, as follows:

"There is persuasive evidence that Fall and Sinclair conspired to defraud the United States. We do not determine whether Fall was bribed, following which the court called Sinclair, Fall a 'faithless officer' and said that appraisal was confirmed by Fall's clandestine and unexplained acquisition of bonds for the Continental company, a Sinclair concern, already formed for some legitimate purpose."

Commenting further, the court said:

"Besides the making of the lease and acquisition Fall and Sinclair, contrary to the government's policy for the conservation of oil reserves for the navy and in disregard of laws construed to prohibit the Mammoth company all the products of the reserves on the basis of certain of royalty, pay for their work, fell off. Fall's silence in the beginning and the nature of the law required him to do this. It was not possible for him legally or faithfully to serve the interest of the United States, or impartially to consider the application of others for leases in the reserve and the lease and agreement were made fraudulently and by means of collusion and conspiracy between them."

It is well that comment end with Justice Butler's words. They speak much.
