A Young Slayer Lauded, His Victim Condemned by a British Court in the Strangest Topsy-Turvy Verdict Ever Handed Down in Such a Case.

Handsome Young Tom Evans, Who Met His Death by Aspiring to the Heart and Hand of the Wealthy "Paint-King" Widow.



LONDON. OFFICIAL disclosure has just been made of a strange love-triangle involving Mrs. Edith Harvey, beautiful English society widow, and her twenty-year-old son, Charlie, who was a member of a young school-chum, Tom Evans, of the Royal Navy.

In this unusual case the formula of such romances has been shuffled; the dead man, who had paid the full penalty for his indiscretions, was accorded no sympathy at the trial in the courthouse of the little Jersey coast town, whereas the killer was extolled by the prosecuting attorney and the court.

With every apparent victim of cold-blooded homicide against Charlie, backed by a full conviction of his deed, the sentence to have been expected—that of hanging in the first degree—was reduced to a term of five years penal servitude with a remission of "guilty of manslaughter."

Charlie Harvey confessed fully to every detail of the crime. With murder in his heart, he had crept from his mother's home and entered the kitchen of his married sister, who lived but a stone's throw down the English roadway. He had extracted the larder and most villainous-looking knife from a drawer of kitchen cutlery. Harvey was a kind, patient husband, who had provided well for his wife and two children, but who had slipped thoughtlessly into the quiet domesticity of his country home.

Edith would have liked a fling at earnings and Piccadilly. Established routine however, triumphed over frequent periods of discontent. Her friends were finally lured in silent resignation.

Then the "paint king" died as even the rich must, leaving his fortune to Edith and his business to their young son, Charlie, who, having finished his course at a fashionable boys' school, was serving a term of apprenticeship in his father's business in view of some day assuming its control.

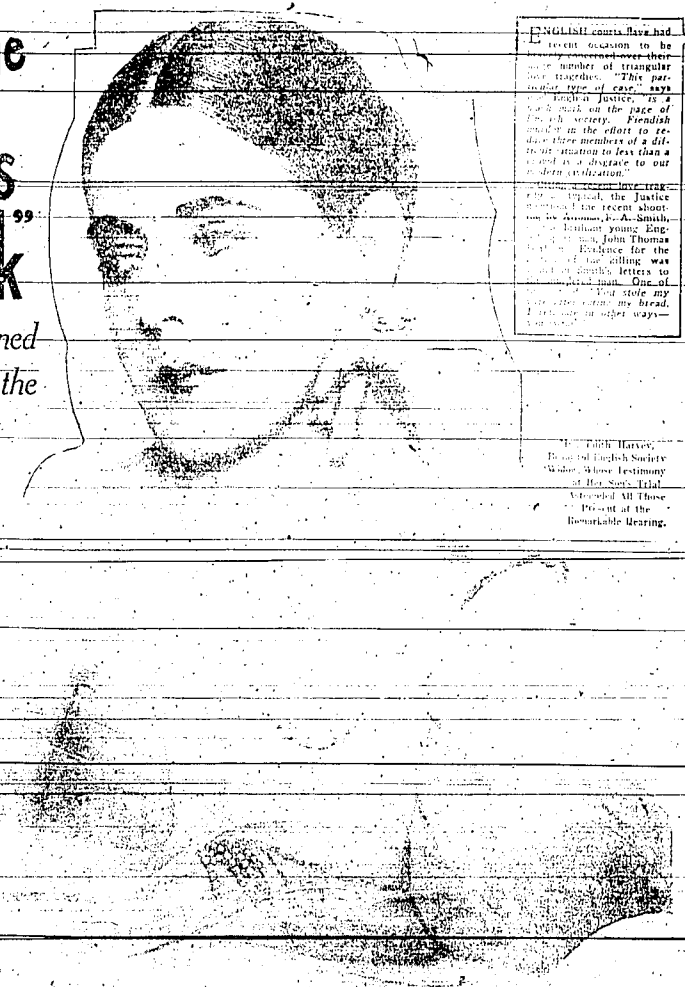

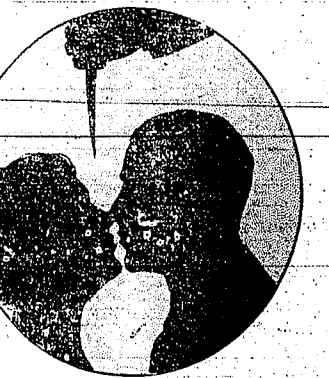

LADOR CONSERVATISM: Never in the history of the American Federation of Labor has that organization had such a year as there were years that that just closed at Los Angeles and this it seems that President William A. 'FOOLING' PLANTS: By tinkering with the sunlight that reaches certain plants it has been found possible to force them to bloom out of season and earlier or later than their usual period. Horticulturists of the United States department of agriculture have proved this in several interesting experiments. In one experiment, they recommended to amateur flower fanciers as an enjoyable hobby. From the experiments it appears that such plants as dahlias, African marigolds, pansies, chrysanthemums, and late varieties of chrysanthemums do not blossom normally because they have reached the proper stage of maturity or because they have grown at an unusual rate. Instead of this, and within reasonable limitations, they seem to produce flowers because of the light period of hours has shortened to the appropriate or natural number of hours.

With this to guide him, the experimenter can fool the flowers into blooming at unusual seasons. This can be done by covering an hour or more before sunset each day, or by taking all the light out of the plants for an hour or two at the end of the day. This produces sunlight regulations approximating autumn with a shorter duration of daylight, and the plants bloom earlier. In the same way it has been found that lengthening the short days of other plants and winter with electric light for proper intensive periods. In the case of the normal season, the other hand, some plants, such as holly, spindle and such, which are long days for flowering, and hence may be forced by use of the electric light to lengthen the day. The horticulturists are still seeking the "why" of this behavior, which varies with different varieties of plants, but it has been determined that their growth and blossoming depend in large measure on the length of the day lighted by the sun.

It is even possible to force different parts of some plants blossoms at different seasons by covering one part for several hours a day, leaving other branches and buds to enjoy the natural exposure. However, there are limits in forcing the flowers for a time in the middle of the day, as no such effect. The day has to be short either in the morning or in the evening.

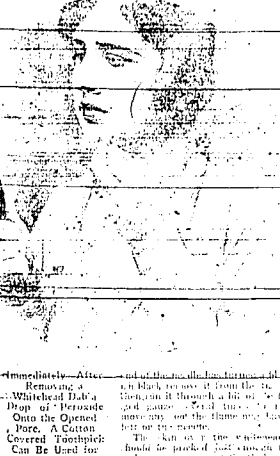
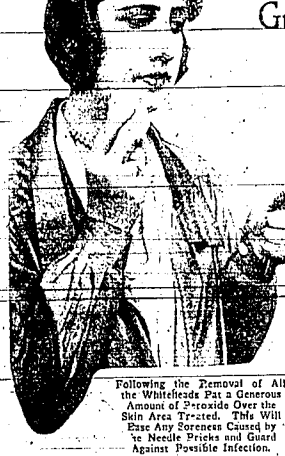

Household Hints

When washing white of cream enamel furniture, try using a tablespoonful of soda in a pint of warm water. Wash with a cloth wet in this, then dry quickly with clean dry paper. Never allow this wet clean enamel surfaces better than soap and water.

If a glass stopper cannot be removed from a bottle, do not keep fretting at it until you break the stopper. Pour oil around the stopper, let it set away in a warm place for half an hour. At the end of the strike the stopper sharply on each side with a hammer handle, and it will easily come out.

If milkweed seeds are to be used in planting, they should be soaked in water for half a day, and then washed out in cold water.
