RELIGIOUS AGE.

When historians begin to turn their perspective upon the present era, it is likely that they may view it in the "electrical age." It is a second industrial revolution—the one stimulated by the electric engine took root in England and fast spread to the American continent. The second, carried forward by the electric super-power system, has found its widest expression in the United States, but is "already" increasingly compassing the industry of the European, and Asiatic continents.

Two events of almost contemporaneous announcement well illustrate this trend—super-power. Great Britain is preparing to invest possibly 250,000,000 pounds into the expansion and coordination of its electric supply, and immediate steps are being taken to centralize the power, heat and light for London and the surrounding districts, an area serving 11,000,000 persons. The project will be carried on and its operation supervised by a central electricity board established by statute. After the London scheme is completed, it will be followed by others, designed to cover the whole country, as well as Scotland and Wales.

Coincident with the undertaking of this British project, the American Gas and Electric company has just made known its completion of an uninterrupted chain of electric generation stations, covering the majority of eastern and southern states from Massachusetts to Florida, and as far west as Illinois. A 10,000-mile ring with Boston, Pensacola and Chicago as the points, the entire circumference of which is 10,000 miles, has been completed, and will connect the hydroelectric resources of the south with the steam-generated power plants of the north.

To date fully two-thirds of the machines in American factories are operated by power from central plants. Production per person increased 36 per cent during the past quarter century in this notable growth has been the increasing utilization of this mechanical power. The amount of horsepower installed primary power producing machines in manufacturing establishments increased by 267 per cent from 1890 to 1925, compared with increases of 175 per cent in output and 87 per cent in the number of persons employed.

It appears that this super-power aspect of industrial evolution has in the main contributed to higher wages, a reduction in the workday and an improvement in general working conditions, effects which have most consistently followed large-scale production in America.

THE ADVENTURE OF MISS ELDER.

MILK PLANT AT BUHL OPERATING

BUHL, Oct. 19.—A new milk condensery is now in operation Sunday morning. The milk is brought to the factory in cans by truckers and sent down the conveyor belt, where it is heated to a boiling point. From there it is sent to the evaporation tanks where it is reduced to 10 percent of its original weight. The water is removed, then it is pumped through the homogenizer, pressure where the butterfat is broken up, then passes through the filter, the homogenized milk is heated to 100° F. and sent to the cooling tanks. From there the milk goes to the bottling tanks where it is sterilized and then packed in cans. The cans are then placed in blast ovens where they are heated to 150° F. under steam pressure for sterilization; it is then cooled and ready for packing.

NEW YORK. The most outstanding football teams in the country are now in their early stages of development, and among them Duke, Princeton, Cornell, Columbia, Yale, Harvard, and Stanford, all of whom will be in action Saturday, Oct. 28, in the first round of the Eastern football season.

In years the really outstanding teams of the Atlantic seaboard will have come to the fore.

With the exception of one or two other October schedules, the coming month will be another chapter in the history of the game.

Princeton, which is the last team to play in the fall, will be in action Saturday, Oct. 28, at New Haven.

The remaining games will be played on Oct. 28.

Hence, after only three or four games Pittsburgh and Princeton are the only major schools in the country which have not yet been defeated.

Incidentally Pitt and Princeton and the two teams mentioned in the above paragraph are the only ones in the east which can claim undefeated records.
