Young Men of Twin Falls Give Their Ideas About 'The Ideal Young Woman'

"Dear Brother:—I trust that my letter will not be too late for you to use in your sermon on 'The Ideal Young Woman,' for I wish to take advantage of this opportunity to let the girls know that some of the things that most of them are not approved by every young man in the community.

Against Double Standard.
 "In the morning, as you are getting up, I am not sure of a double standard in our boys and girls, but I think you are right in pointing out their standard in the Bible. 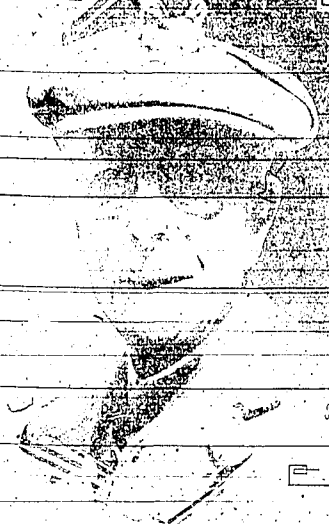

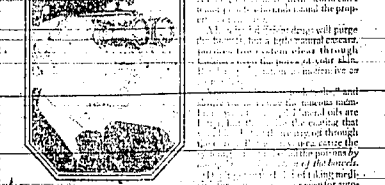

ELECTRICAL AGE

When historians begin to turn their respective pages upon the present day, it is likely that they may see the "electrical age" as a second industrial revolution. The first, inaugurated by the steam engine, took root in England and fast spread to the American continent. The second, carried forward by the electric super-power system, has found its widest expansion in the United States, but is today increasingly compressing the industry of the European and Asiatic continents.

Two events of almost contemporaneous announcement will illustrate this trend to super-power. Great Britain is preparing to install possibly 25,000,000 pounds into the expansion and re-orientation of its electrical supply, and immediate steps are being taken to coincide with the undertaking at London and the surrounding districts, an area serving 11,000,000 persons. The project will be carried out and its operation supervised by a central electrical board, established by statute. After the London scheme is completed, it will be followed by others, designed to cover the whole country, as well as Scotland and Wales.

Incidentally, the undertaking at the British project, the American Gas and Electric company has just made known its completion of an uninterrupted chain of electric generation stations covering the majority of eastern and southern states from Massachusetts to Florida, and as far west as Illinois, a 1,000-mile first night-long line. Results are in the form of 10,000,000 horsepower which will connect the hydro-electric resources of the south with the steam-generated power plants of the north.

To date fully two-thirds of the machines in American factories are operated by motor, from central plants. Conservation of power, consequent upon the use of motors, has been a potent factor in the United States, and one of the principal factors in its notable growth has been the increasing utilization of this mechanical power. The amount of horsepower installed primarily power-producing machines in manufacturing establishments increased by 26 per cent from 1925 to 1935, comprising 70 per cent of the total horsepower available and 40 per cent of the total horsepower installed.

It is apparent that this super-power aspect of industrial production has in the main contributed to higher wages, a reduction in the working day, and an improvement in general working conditions; effects which have most consistently followed large-scale production in America.

THE ADVENTURE OF MISS ELDER

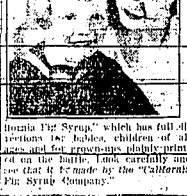

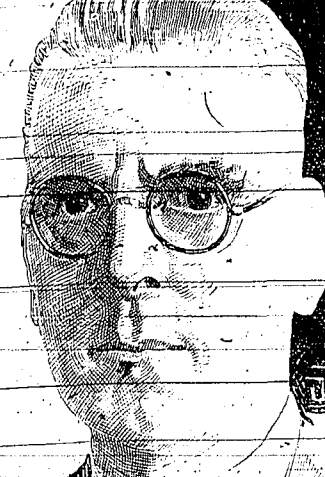
