ROME, Oct. 23.—Benito Mussolini, outspoken fascist leader and real ruler of Italy, after defying statements and kings who he disregarded, has clashed with the pope, it was believed here today. To Mussolini was attributed a fascist party manifesto which declared frankly the "new Italy" would not grant the pope sovereignty over the Vatican territory in Rome.

To the pope was attributed responsibility for articles in the *Osservatore Romano*, official Vatican newspaper, which caused the manifesto. The articles hinted that the pope would be satisfied if given absolute control over the small Roman area covered by the Vatican grounds.
