## AMOS DENOUNCES SIN

(World's Temperance Sunday)

LESSON TEXT.—Amos 2:1-12.

LESSON TESTIMONY.—Read and remember the lesson text. The Lord is God of hosts shall be with you as ye have spoken.

YOUTH TOPIC.—"The Punishment of Sin."

JUNIOR TOPIC.—What God thinks of us.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC.—The Devil's Traffic Is Free.

ADULT TOPIC.—Young People and Adults TOPIC—Interdependence and Associated Evil.

Amos, a shepherd and truthteller (Amos 1:14; 1:5) was called to prophesy against the people of Israel. He was neither in the prophetic line nor trained in the prophetic schools.

1. The Sons of Judah (2:4-5).

In the first of the book Amos sets forth judgments upon the surrounding nations. The other documents were written after the prophet came from God's judgment: The nation or individual that thus shall surely be judged (Amos 3:20).

2. Failed to keep the Lord's commandments (v. 6).

3. They despised the law of the Lord.

To despite means to spurn to disregar.

4. They despised God's Word.

Because they despised God, they fell into like errors. Deceitful and conduct are inseparable. Thinking wrong precedes doing wrong.

5. Judgment upon Israel (v. 6).

This was literally fulfilled a century and a half later in the capture of Jerusalem by the Babylonians.

6. The Sins of Israel (2:6-8).

The message of this prophet now comes directly to the northern king dom.

7. "Sold the righteous for silver" (v. 8).

The judge for a bribe of silver, declared himself to be guilty.

8. Sold the poor for a pair of shoes" (v. 6).

Likely this refers to the practice of selling slaves; the dealer who could not pay for a pair of shoes which had been sold to him on time.

9. "Pains after the dust of the earth on heads of the poor" (v. 3).

The very poor means to expect death.

10. So notorious were their sins that because they even arranged after the earth which the down-trodden poor cast upon their heads in mourning because of their misery.

11. Turned aside the way of the just (v. 7).

Those grasping rich men turned aside the road; that is, those who would not stand up for their rights.

12. Licentiousness (v. 7).

So notorious were their immorality practices that they even got into the act of incestuous prostitution.

This was not merely the case of falling into sensuous sins, but was indulged in with the definite purpose of fulfilling God's profane life holy name.

13. Adultery (v. 7).

This hot oil frequented the places of idolatrous worship, but lay down on the clothes taken from the poor, and drink wine bought with money extorted from the poor in unjust dues.

14. "God's Goodness to Israel" (vv. 8-9).

God's manifold blessings and His goodness are now presented in contrast with the base practices of the nation, in order to heighten the picture of their own depravity.

15. "The Amalekites stand for all perverse people whom God removeth from Palestine to make room for Israel" (v. 10).

## HOLDUP MAKES CONFESSION OF SIMILAR JOBS

Sheriff M. E. Finch tells of attempt to kidnap from County jail by Mark Miller, Young Man Captured Following Sunday Holdup.

Mark Miller, who first gave his age as 20, and yesterday said that he was 21, who was arrested here Sunday night in a gun chase following the robbery of the Texaco filling station, told the young man he had been advised to question officers that he and Buck Jones, the man who aided him in the robbery here, had planned a series of holdups. Miller said last night he left and came to Pocatello the next night, according to authorities.

Tony, Sheriff M. E. Finch, gave the following information about Miller—Sheriff Finch stated this morning that Miller has tried to make an escape from the county jail, but that the man in custody kept one of the latrines that was brought to him at meal time and used it to loosen a couple of bricks in the bars across the window of his cell.

Removed Cell Bricks.

Miller declared that Miller removed the bricks from the outside wall of his cell, but did not tell the police he wanted to permit him to escape. The officer believes that the man planned to get through the lime quarters of the sheriff's office to the exterior of the sheriff's house, and then across the sidewalk to the passenger elevator in the courthouse to freedom.

The admittance of the Idaho Falls and Pocatello stations to the information gathered by Sheriff Finch, and the county and Deputy Sheriff Carlson, former police chief of Idaho Falls, and Ralph Carter of the Idaho Falls Police Department, who came here and identified Miller upon hearing of the robbery here and the catching of Miller, Idaho Falls officers and Mr. Carter obtained the information from the sheriff.

These descriptions were the same as those of the man who robbed the Idaho Falls station, who had been told that he could be held here indefinitely, identify Miller. His confessions were the result of their questioning and that of Deputy Sheriff Prater and child-of-People.

Miller told the officers that Buck Jones kept all the money taken in his partner, and that he had been told he would be held until he turned in about \$70 at Idaho Falls and \$20 from the Subway station at Pocatello when they secured him.
