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Whites Sell Upon Par With Russets

With the official minimum temperature of 25° set by two large dealers, both of whom had been beaten, the market was quiet. Little damage to apples and potatoes was discovered today. Apples still in the orchards and unpeeled or partly peeled were sold at 15¢ per bushel. Shippers of russets, however, were not to be beaten. Some 100 bushels of the annual Red Cross drive to be made here this month, and told of the work generally.

At the market, however, there was no sign of any movement in the price of russets.

The potato market continues to remain weak, warehousemen reported today, with demand dull and very little stock available. The price of 15¢ per bushel of the crop is now in sight, with no indication at the prevailing prices for the growers to grade D. S. No. 1 standards. Russet is moving in combination with

the potato market—shucks—blue, white, yellow, red, etc., round and flat.

Warehousemen were sure that this is an unusual situation, as the russet has always commanded a premium over the white potato.
