'PINKY' GRANGE BOOSTS FAMOUS NAME AT ILLINI

Red's Brother 'Finds Self' After 3 Years and Stars Against Michigan.

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 1.—The University of Illinois campus again resounded with the name of the well-known football player named Grange. This time the name is for Garland "Pinky" Grange, brother of Harold, who starred with Illinois for three years and then, under the direction of C. F. Bylsie, turned his football fame into dollars.

The younger Grange, pictured on the left, features played an important part in Illinois' defeat of Michigan last Saturday. "Pinky" caught the opening kickoff and carried it out 29 yards when the game opened. In 1931 "Red" ran Michigan's opening kick off down the field for a touchdown.

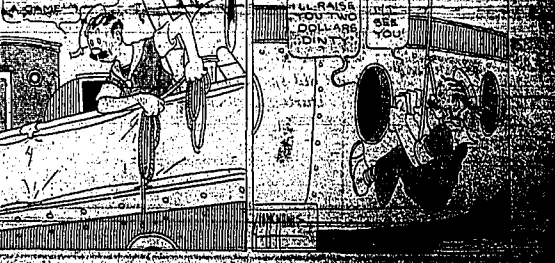
