## FALL-SINCLAIR RETRIAL IS SET ON JANUARY 16

Government Unable to Recall Witnesses Sooner, Is Cause of Delay.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—District Attorney Gordon announced this afternoon he was revoking a warrant sworn out a few hours earlier by one of his assistants, that the arrest of Harry P. Sinclair of Michigan, on a charge of conspiracy to tamper with the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy jury.

Gordon's action was taken after a conference with George F. Sawyer, one of Sinclair's attorneys.

Not intended. (Gordon announced merely that he had not intended that the warrant be issued.)

The government action in holding a March Day, Sinclair embargo, on jury tampering charges, was maintained, however.

Sinclair was released on \$25,000 bond on a charge that he attempted to influence the actions and decisions of the jurors in the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy trial which went to a mistrial Wednesday.

Shifting developments. Re-arrest of the juror brought to a halt by a stipulation that developments in the jury tampering investigation resulting from the mistrial, the government would not seek a warrant for Sinclair and the other jurors.

As Day was available he was indicted under United States Commission Turnage and held in \$25,000 bond. Meanwhile the warrant was not being against Sinclair as he was in New York.

"Sinclair isn't going to run away," said Gordon yesterday in explanation of his move cancelling the warrant. It was generally believed the government was taking this course out of convenience for Sinclair and to avoid an indication that the government was dropping its charge to tamper with the multimillionaire oil and race horse man in charge of jury surveillance.
