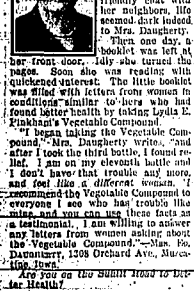

RED CROSS NURSING SERVICE WAGES WORLD BATTLE AGAINST DISEASE

The American Red Cross nursing service is waging a campaign against disease and suffering which literally reaches around the world. Information obtained in the organization's annual report, made public by the local chapter, shows that through the establishment of schools of nursing, the emergency care of the sick, the maintenance of health in homes, and the instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick by nurses recruited from all ranks, it has placed modern nursing in many lands which had never known it.

At home, as well as abroad, the Red Cross nursing service plays a major role in meeting emergency needs. Its nurses, according to the annual report, consists of 46,000 nurses who have passed exacting qualifications in every direction. In all the world, the Florida hurricane left more than 8,000 injured persons in its wake, the Red Cross recruited nurses and doctors from its reserve. When the Mississippi valley suffered the most destructive flood in its history, the Red Cross nursing service was called upon to help.

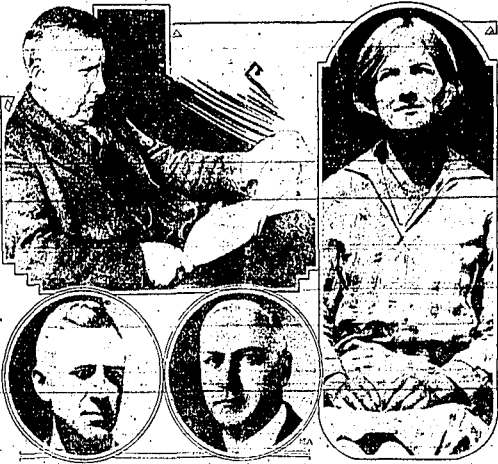

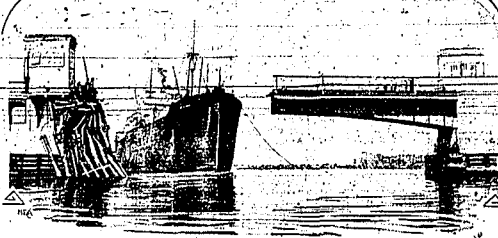
