The Times yesterday launched a campaign for the "establishment here of canning factories, juice processing plants, dehydrating plants, etc., to the end that the Twin Falls district may have a diversification of industry which will put an end to all conditions which could possibly be twisted or garbled into talk about 'bad years.' The Times said that thousands and thousands of tons of fruit and other produce was going to waste and that this so-called 'second' production should be put through plants of the above mentioned nature and shaped up so that this brings thousands of dollars of additional revenue to southern Idaho."

In connection with the sugar factory the thought comes to mind that with the enormous amount of apples grown here Twin Falls should have a large vinegar factory. If southern Idaho apples rank with the best of them in the markets of the world, and they undoubtedly do, why would not the seconds and ends make vinegar of A-1 quality? They would, and the proposal to bring a first class vinegar plant to Twin Falls is surely added to the Times' industrial expansion program; also the plant is offered to the new officers and directors of the Chamber of Commerce for inclusion in their 1927-28 schedule.

The Times' suggestions will not permit of any undue delay. This is the time of the year when industries are looking for new locations if they plan changes. This is the period when, if there is any spare capital, its owners are seeking an opportunity for profitable investments. In other words, Twin Falls and southern Idaho have an opportunity at salesmanship. Whether anything develops is squarely up to the leaders.

And in the meantime the idea of establishing an air passenger express along the eight freight route between Salt Lake City, Ogden, way points, Twin Falls, Boise, Portland and Seattle should always receive proper attention.

## PRICES FOR CASH GRAINS MOVE UP ON MOST MARTS IN WEEK OF NOV. 1

112½ at Chicago and \$1.35 to \$1.36 at Toledo.

The export demand for United States wheat continued for United States wheat, while white delivery Texas Gulf ports. Red winter was quoted in Liverpool at \$1.45 per bushel. No. 2 Market wheat at \$1.20 per bushel. No. 2 red winter and soft white wheat from the Pacific coast at \$1.25. Export movement on the Pacific coast seems still in progress, but demand for foreign grain, particularly export white, was being quoted at Portland at \$1.25. The latest purchases were made in the hope of getting a better price for dry weather wheat, except sharp decline in the prices of this kind of wheat, and some who have netted \$1.10 per bushel, and up to \$1.25 per bushel. Wet wheat was selling at Portland at around \$1.10 per bushel depending on position. The market for first hard was supplemented this small heat barley crop.


