

TAX ON ESTATE TO BE RETAINED BY COMMITTEE

Defies President Because Apparent Lobby Seeking Its Repeal

By PAUL H. MALLOS. Full-page Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The House ways and means committee apparently intends to retain in its new revenue bill the federal gift tax levied on the federal estate. The committee has approved on the White House and the treasury.

The committee today fulfilled its promise to one in four of the existing gift permitting statute to raise it up to 50 per cent of the federal law, thereby seeking uniformity of state levels on inheritance.

Chairman of the Ways and Means committee, coupled with defense of the existing system by republican chairman Green and the democratic tax leader, Representative Garner, Texas, have placed the committee in a difficult attitude toward the treasury recommendations.

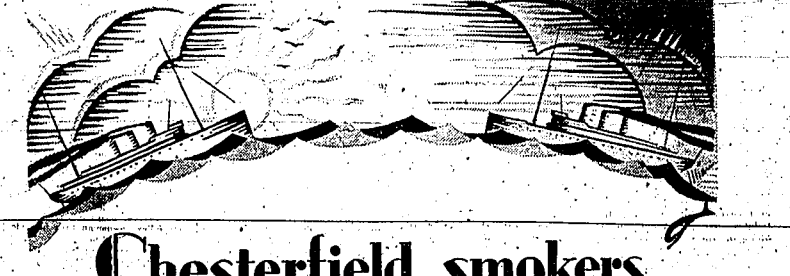
