TWIN FALLS JOINS TRIBUTES TO HEROES OF WORLD STRUGGLE

Senator Sweeley Addresses Services at Theater This Morning; Business Houses Close and Veterans March; Volleys Fired to Honor Dead.

Formal observance of the end, nine years ago, at the eleventh hour of the World War was held at 11 o'clock this morning at the Ophir theater. Senator M. J. Sweeley was the speaker of the occasion, while the regular American Legion ritual service was observed.

SERVICES HELD AT WASHINGTON

Canada Joins U. S. in a Kenedzvous With War Dead, Dedicating Monument.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Nine years after the Armistice day on which fighting between the Allies and Germany ended, Canada joined the United States today in a rendezvous with war dead.

A grand ceremony here today has its climax at 2:15 p. m. in eastern standard time, in presentation by Canada and the government of a monumental cross at Arlington national cemetery in memory of American soldiers who served with the Canadian expeditionary forces.

President and Mrs. Coolidge made a pilgrimage to Arlington at 10 o'clock today to lay a wreath on the tomb of the nation's Unknown Soldier. Besides the president and his party, a brief party of about 100 men, many of them in military uniform, were present.

At 11 o'clock a military band played for assistance in the 1927 Grand roll call which is hoped to swell the army's membership to 2,000,000.

This afternoon the memory of Woodrow Wilson was honored, while he is honored at his tomb in Washington cathedral. Mary Pick McLeod, Wilson's daughter, will say a formal valedictory on the tomb in the presence of American Legionnaires.

URGE CHURCHES ACT FOR PEACE

Another War Will Shatter Civilization Says World Alliance Appeal.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 11.—An American flag appeal to American Christians for the creation of "international substitutes for war" was issued here today by the World Alliance for International Friendship through the Churches.

"Nothing else that we as Christian churches do matters much if another world war—another devastating catastrophe," read the appeal, which bore the signatures of 24 leaders in the movement for world peace.

"Yet, such a catastrophe is inevitable," it said, "unless the nations forestall it by the positive substitution of co-operative methods for mutual slaughter."

"We plead that all which we hold dear for ourselves and for the world and all that we work for as Christians concerned for the faith and spiritual equality of men, be at stake."

"The gospel of the Prince of Peace can not be reconciled with war of permanent violence in the same world with it."

"Another international conflict would be a devastating blow not only to the institutions but to the spirit of Christianity."

Has Given Life Saving Instruction to More Than 125 People in State During Past Year; Women of Idaho Also Given Instruction.

Waging a nation wide campaign against accidental deaths, which each year take toll of life in excess of American lives, in action during the World War, the American Red Cross has given life saving instruction to more than 125 persons in Idaho during its last fiscal year.
